February Weather.

The following data, covering a period of 16 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau records at Raleigh, for the month of February:

Mean or normal temperature, 43 degrees. The warmest month was that of 1890, with an average of 53 degrees. The coldest month was that of 1895, with an average of 33 degrees. The highest temperature was 80 degrees on February 25, 1890. The lowest temperature was 2 degrees below zero on February 14th, 1899. Average date on which first "killing" frost occurred in autumn, Nov. 1st. Average date on which last "killing" frost occurred in spring, April 8th.

Average precipitation for the month, 4.28 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 12. The greatest monthly precipitation was 7.48 inches in 1899. The least monthly precipitation was 0.42 inches in 1898. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 2.95 inches on February 5th and 6th, 1896. The greatest amount of snowfall recorded in any 24 consecutive hours (record extending to winter of 1897 only) was 17.7 inches on February 15th to 13th, 1899.

Average number of clear days, 9; partly cloudy days, 7; cloudy days, 12.

The prevailing winds have been from the southwest. The highest velocity of the wind was 35 miles from the north on February 21st, 1891.
