BILLS INTRODUCED.

Bills and resolutions were introduced, read the first time and disposed of as follows:

S. B. 97, Bellamy: To correct certain probates and regulations in the county of Brunswick.

S. B. 98, Webb, by request: To amend chapter 272, Public Laws of 1901, relating to local option elections...

S. B. 99, Godwin: To repeal chapter 750, Public Laws of 1901, in so far as it relates to holding municipal elections...

S. B. 601, McBryde: To form a special school district from parts of Cumberland and Robeson counties.

S. B. 602, Spruill: To authorize the commissioners of Tyrrell county to issue bonds and levy a special tax.

S. B. 603, Godwin: To prevent fast driving over the public bridges across the Cape Fear River at Lillington...

S. B. 604, Hicks, of Granville: To authorize the town of Oxford to issue bonds to establish water-works...

S. B. 605, Webb: To incorporate The Good Roads Association of Asheville and Buncombe county.

S. B. 606, Beasley: To amend the boundaries of the town of Waxhaw.

S. B. 607, Webb, by request: To declare eight hours a day's work on State mechanical work.

S. B. 608, Vann: To change the time of holding certain terms of court in First Judicial district.

S. B. 609, Pharr: To amend the Corporation Law of North Carolina.

S. B. 610, Pharr: To validate irregular probates.

S. B. 611, Pharr: To amend chapter 164, Laws of 1899, being an act, entitled: "An act to establish the North Carolina Railroad Commission."

S. B. 612, McLaughlin: To prohibit the manufacture and sale of liquors in the city of Statesville and providing for an election.

S. B. 613, Woodard: To submit to the qualified voters of Wilson county the question of whether spirituous liquors shall be manufactured and sold by retail or sold at a dispensary in Wilson county.

S. B. 614, Gilliam: To amend the charter of Tarboro.

S. B. 615, Gilliam: To regulate the sale of liquor in Township No. 1, Edgecombe county.

S. B. 616, Gilliam: To amend chapter 238, Private Laws of 1901.

S. B. 617, Gilliam: To amend chapter 265, Private Laws of 1899.

S. B. 147, S. B. 475: To prohibit the sale of fire crackers more than three inches long, and toy pistols, upon third reading.

H. B. 382, S. B. 407: Empowering commissioners of Gaston and Mecklenburg counties to construct a bridge over the Catawba river.

JEALOUSY CRAZED HE SHOT HIMSELF.

Suicide of Negro Maddened by Despair.

He Sent Two Bullets Into the Woman He Loved After a Vain Search for His Rival.

The city was startled yesterday morning by an attempted murder and a suicide.

A negro man named William Edward Patterson, committed suicide yesterday morning on the corner of Saunders and North street...

Yesterday morning about ten o'clock Patterson went to the store of Winston & Wiggins and got the porter (a small negro boy) to go to the home of Mr. W. C. Eatman...

Patterson turned abruptly around and returned to the store and attempted to go in, saying, "I am going to kill Go. McRae, who I saw go in here a few minutes ago."

Officer Creighton, who was in the neighborhood at the time, arrived only a few minutes after he had shot himself.

The motive for the ghastly crime was jealousy, and in this fit of passion he committed this awful deed.

Patterson is known in the police courts of this city, and shows plainly a few weeks ago on complaint of Mr. Eatman, for disorderly conduct and fined by the mayor.

Patterson has no people living in this city, and he is not very well known here.

He was about 25 years old. The woman he shot was about 20.

In looking through the pockets of Patterson's clothes a knife, several collar buttons and two letters were found.

The second letter is supposed to have been written a short while before he committed the deed, and shows plainly that his intentions were to kill the woman.

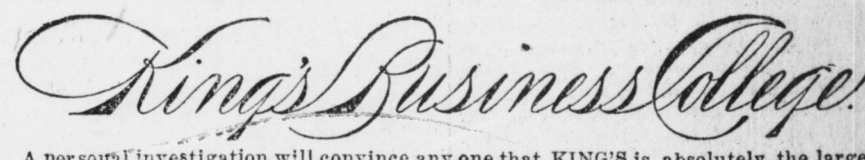
