is required to answer under the Stat practice; and it must appear that all of the defendants are residents and citizens of another State, except as heretofore stated, in cases of separable controversies, while the act which authorizes the removal of cases on acount of prejudice and local influence among other things provides that "any defendant, at any time before the trial thereof," may upon proper showing have the case removed to the Federal court. Therefore, even though a num-per of citizens of the State where the suit is instituted may be joined as defendants with non-residents, such joinder cannot deprive the non-resident defendants or any of them of the right to have the case removed to the Federal Court. Where a case is removed from a State to the Federal Court, if for any reason, the plaint? s in doubt as to whether the Federal Court has jurisdiction of the subject-matter of the controversy he may make a motion to remand the cause to the State Court, and it then be-comes the duty of the court before whom the same is pending to decide the question as to whether the court in the first instance had jurisdiction in the first instance had jurisdiction, and if the court should be of the opinion that it did not have jurisdiction the case should be remanded to the State Court for trial. There can be no review of the court's action in such cases, unless it should appear at some stage of the proceeding that the validity of the Constitution of the United States or some other Federal question is involved in the controversy, and in that event the defendant would be entitled to a writ of error for the purpose of having the same reviewed by the Supreme Court of the United States, after the highest court of the

All at once there was an awful crash, and simultaneously there was a peal of thunder and flash of lightning. The immense crowd stampeded and made a mad rush for the doors and windows, falling over each other and tramping down women and children in their eagerness to get out before any one else. After the pandemonium and rein of terror was over it was found that the sleepers had given away and the floor had fallen in.
