

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

The people of this community have the correct idea about the education of their children. A few years ago they voted a local tax by a majority of one vote. Some good men opposed it. But the school has been so successful that nobody would go back to little old schools with one teacher. The school committee here, composed of Messrs. W. G. Wilson, L. F. Uzile, and their children, have built a modern school building that, with the furniture and lot, cost \$32,500. The school tax is thirty cents, and, with the regular fund, enables the committee to employ three teachers and give the children of this district as good a public school as you will find in the State.

Mr. H. M. Lilly, a graduate of the A. and M. College, who does credit to that institution. He is assisted by W. C. Wilsom, a capable teacher, and by Miss Bessie Poe Law, a brilliant graduate of St. Mary's School. The enrollment of the year was 192. The school opened its full house today to hear the annual address by Mr. Joseph Daniels, editor of The News and Observer. He was introduced by Mr. D. O. Uzile. He spoke nearly an hour and at the conclusion of his speech Prof. J. Y. Joyner and County Superintendent Tarlington and W. G. Uzile, chairman of the school committee, made brief addresses. The community is proud of its school and has a right to the pride it feels.

AN ERROR OF JUDGMENT.

The Grounding of the Rhode Island to be Investigated by a Court of Inquiry.

(By the Associated Press.)

Washington, May 9.—The report of Captain Perry Garst, of the battleship Rhode Island, on the grounding of that vessel on York Spit recently had been received at the Navy Department. It shows that the cause of the accident was an error of judgment and Captain Garst has suggested a court of inquiry, which has been ordered.

The details for a court of inquiry is as follows: The morning was clear, the Rhode Island was clear, and the York Spit light and buoy at the entrance to York river were visible. Captain Garst stated that the distance from the buoy was misjudged and the ship went aground. The reason he did not report earlier was because his ship was not equipped with wireless. The Mississippi reported the Rhode Island and reported the accident by the use of her wireless.
