IN AND ABOUT THE CITY.

Farmers around this section are complaining of too much rain.

Pullen Park swimming pool is well patronized both day and night.

Although it rained heavily in Raleigh yesterday afternoon, there was no rain at Pullen Park.

Governor Glenn has gone to Reidsville on both personal and official business, and will probably return to Raleigh tonight or tomorrow.

Penitentiary guards will go to Wilmington today to guard convicts who will work on the new freight yard of the Atlantic Coast Line there.

Mr. T. F. Cheatham told the reporter that a good quantity of tobacco was sold on the Raleigh market yesterday and that prices were satisfactory.

Mr. Alfred Myatt and little son, of Willow Springs, were in the city yesterday. Mr. Myatt reports a washout at his pond, which is popular with fishermen.

State Veterinarian Tait Butler is expected back from a visit to the Western States tomorrow. While away he addressed several scientific associations.

Mr. John S. Calvert, who has been ill with fever in this city since the spring, has returned to Wilmington and resumed his duties in the offices of the Atlantic Coast Line.

A negro woman of bad reputation from Columbia, S. C., was ordered to leave the city yesterday by the police justice, judgment in her case being suspended on condition that she leave the city.

Andy Allen, one of the old and best-liked negroes in Raleigh, who was a waiter at the Yarrowborough House several years, died in this city Wednesday night and was buried in Mount Hope cemetery yesterday afternoon.

Governor Grants Clemency to a Five Year Man.

Governor Glenn has pardoned John Ennis, a white man of Caldwell county, who has served five years of a sentence for horse stealing. The pardon was secured by Mr. W. C. Newland, of Caldwell county.

Governor Glenn granted the pardon conditionally. The action he took was urged in letters from the trial judge, solicitor, and several citizens of that county.

It was stated that Ennis took the horse while he was intoxicated, and rode it about twenty miles and then sold it without making any effort to evade the pursuers.
