## THE EDNA MAY ACCIDENT.

> (Special to News and Observer.) Manteo, N. C., Aug. 20.--After a day's search by a party of men and boats the body of Miss Cora Midgett, the young lady who was drowned in the accident aboard the Edna May between here and Nag's Head with an excursion Friday night, was found in the sound near where the explesion took place, at six o'clock Saturday afternoon.

This was one of the worst accidents ever known in this section in the use of gasoline boats, and it was only a bare chance, after all, that the whole party of twenty-six was not lost, the most of them being women and chil-

It seems that one of the pipes had been leaking, and a lantern being carried in where the gas had formed, cased an explosion in the engine room, blowing open the door between a part of the house on the stern, and setting the boat on fire in the channel of eight feet of water. It is not known whether Miss Cora Midgett, board accidently or chose thus to act in preference to remaining on what then seemed to be a boat being consumed in the flames. In the pandemenium several followed her. Just at this juncture a darkey fisherman. Frank Spruill, came along with a sail Mr. M. Miller, a drummer of Eliza-

beth City, came dangerously near losing his life, undergoing all of the experiences of drowning in a gallant effort to save Miss Midgett. He recovered after two or three hours' work by the doctors and men of the Life Saving Service at resuscitation. Jarvis Midgett came near losing his life try-ing to save Miller after the undertaking to rescue Miss Midgett had been abandoned.
