TO PAY FLOATING DEBT. Greensboro Votes for a Big Issue of Bonds.

LOCATION IN SIXTY DAYS. Reformatory Trustees Leave the Matter in the Hands of a Committee.

(By the Associated Press.) Greensboro, N. C., Oct. 8.—The board of trustees of the Stonewall Jackson training and industrial school were in session here tonight from 7 until 10 o'clock, for the purpose of adopting a set of by-laws and selecting a site for the proposed reformatory for North Carolina. Nine of the fourteen members of the board were present. Propositions were heard from a number of towns in the State seeking to induce the board to locate with them; among them, Concord, Statesville and Greensboro. After carefully considering, it was decided to leave the matter to the auditing committee with power to act. It is believed that the school will be located within the next sixty days.

NO BEAR YET. Baying of Dogs Taken as an Encouraging Sign.

INFERNAL MACHINES. Confession obtained and Warning Given in Time to Prevent Harm.

(By the Associated Press.) Denver, Oct. 8.—Governor Henry A. Buchtel, David H. Coffey, president of the First National Bank of Denver, and Charles B. Kountze, president of the Colorado National Bank, received yesterday afternoon information from a confidential source that infernal machines containing sufficient dynamite to have caused great destruction of life and property had been placed in the city. The machines were located by chief of Police Delaney, who had obtained a confession from Kemp V. Bigelow, by whom they were mailed, and no one was hurt.
