YESTERDAY THEY MADE UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA BITE THE DUST AT NORFOLK BY A SCORE OF 10 TO 4

A. & M. CHAMPION OF ENTIRE SOUTH

Defeats University of Virginia 10 to 4

UNDEFEATED IN 1907

From Beginning to End the Game was Clean and Straight Forward and Appealed to Lovers of the Sport--No Substituting for the Farmers.

 NORFOLK, VA., Nov. 28.—North Carolina Agricultural and Mechanical College this afternoon defeated University of Virginia by a score of ten to four, capturing the championship of the South and completing the season of nineteen hundred and seven as the undefeated eleven of the South. The game, while punctuated by poor work, was brilliant in many parts and from beginning to end was a clean, exciting game, such as appeals to the true lovers of the sport.

Members of the refereeing committee penalized both elevens, sometimes at critical moments, but his decisions and those of Empire Albert Cox were taken as eminently fair and satisfactory to both sides. Carolina had the best of the game. Several times Virginia was saved from more disastrous defeat by Carolina's poor work. Twice Full Back Johnson, who took Captain Von Glahn's place, failed on extra point kicks from the field and a time was called when ten seconds would have found the sheroed flying at Virginia's goal.

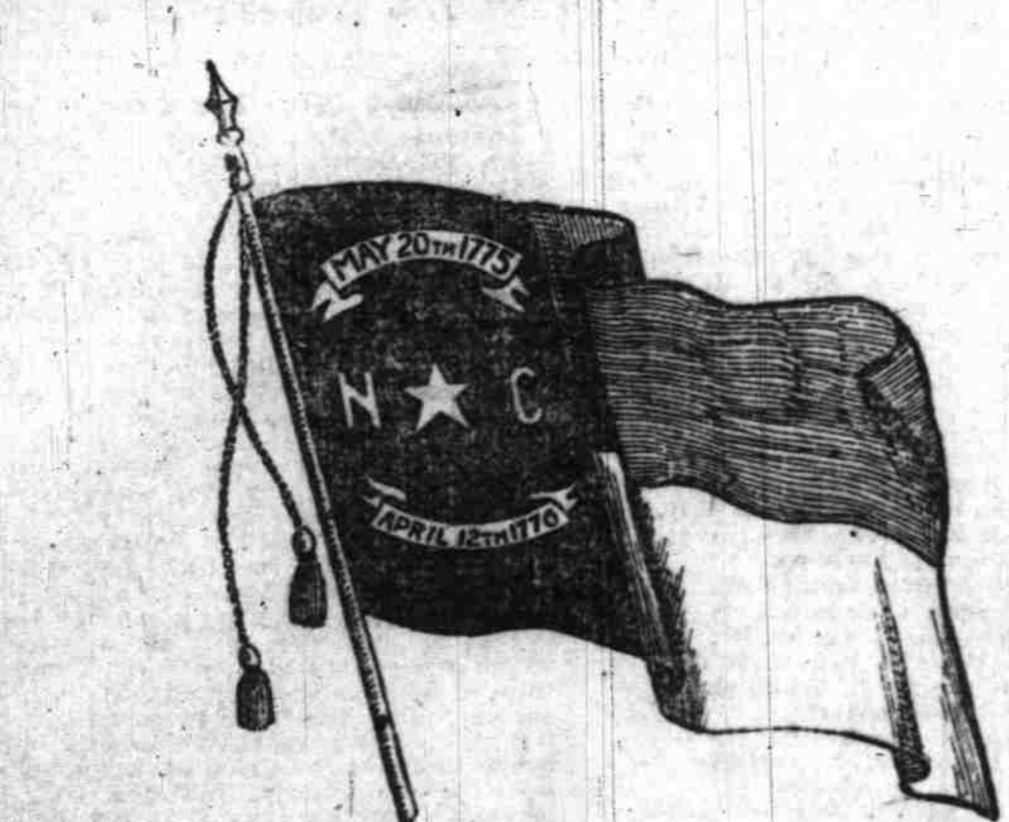
Virginia substituted Randolph for Maddox in the second half, but every Farmer starting in the game stuck out to the finish.

Carolina had the kick-off in the first half and with a good wind against him Johnson sent the ball thirty-five yards and Tull downed Hume in his tracks as he caught the ball.

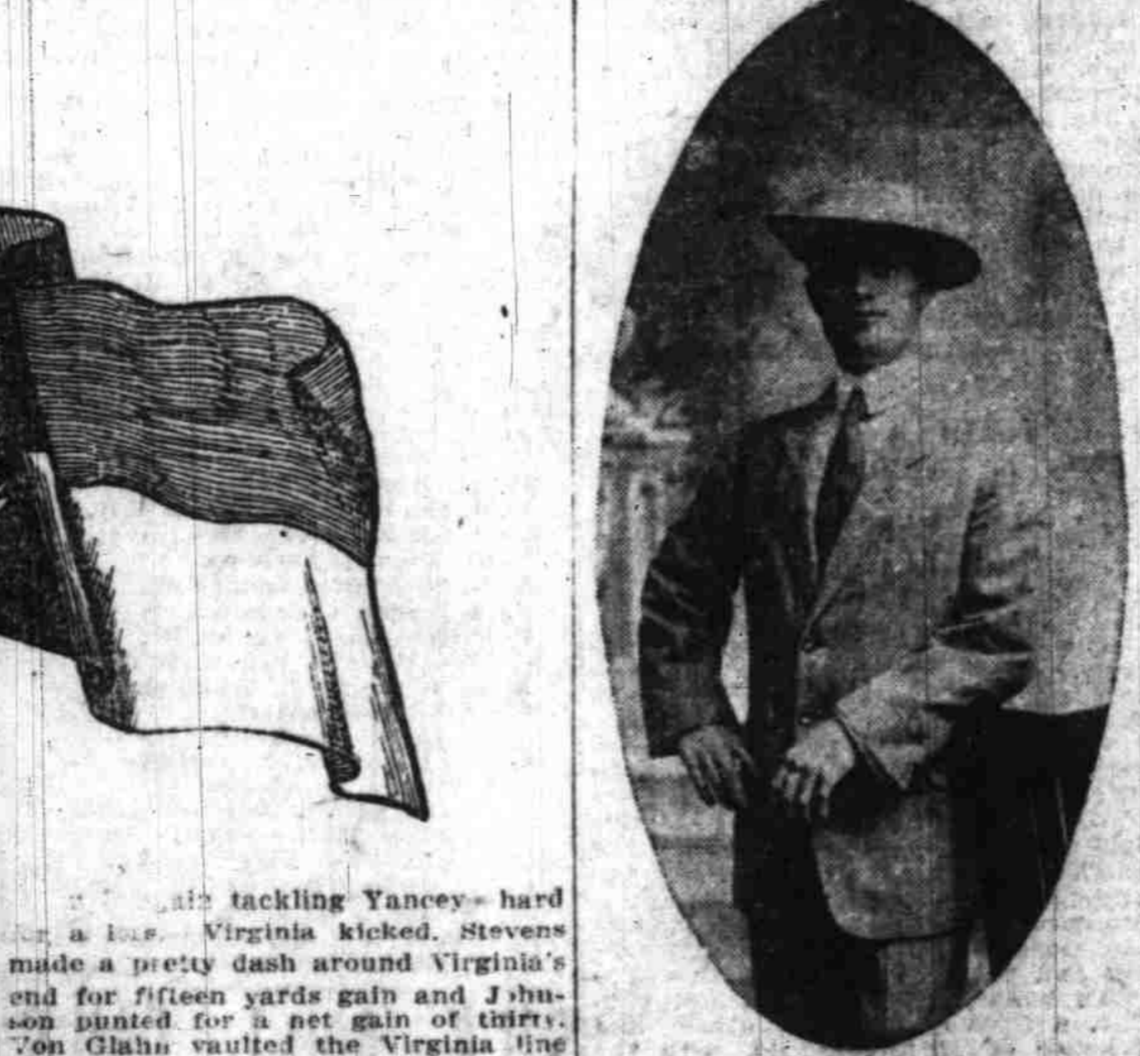
The first half was full of punting. Yancey, for Virginia, was at his best and Johnson was in poor shape. Virginia handled her forward passes well and the Carolina farmers in the excitement of the beginning lost on theirs. But soon Johnson got into form, the eleven from Carolina settled down to hard work and the score of Virginia made the Tar Heels more determined than ever to gain victory.

Stroud and Beebe were doing the offensive work for A. and M. James and Tull and Von Glahn were doing the best defensive work and later Stevens joined the ranks of those who were doing the star work for the Old North State.

Virginia got the ball on her fifty-yard line and through the line Neff and Hume and Yancey ploughed for fifteen yards, then fifteen were gained by a beautiful forward pass and Hume took the place kick, which Yancey

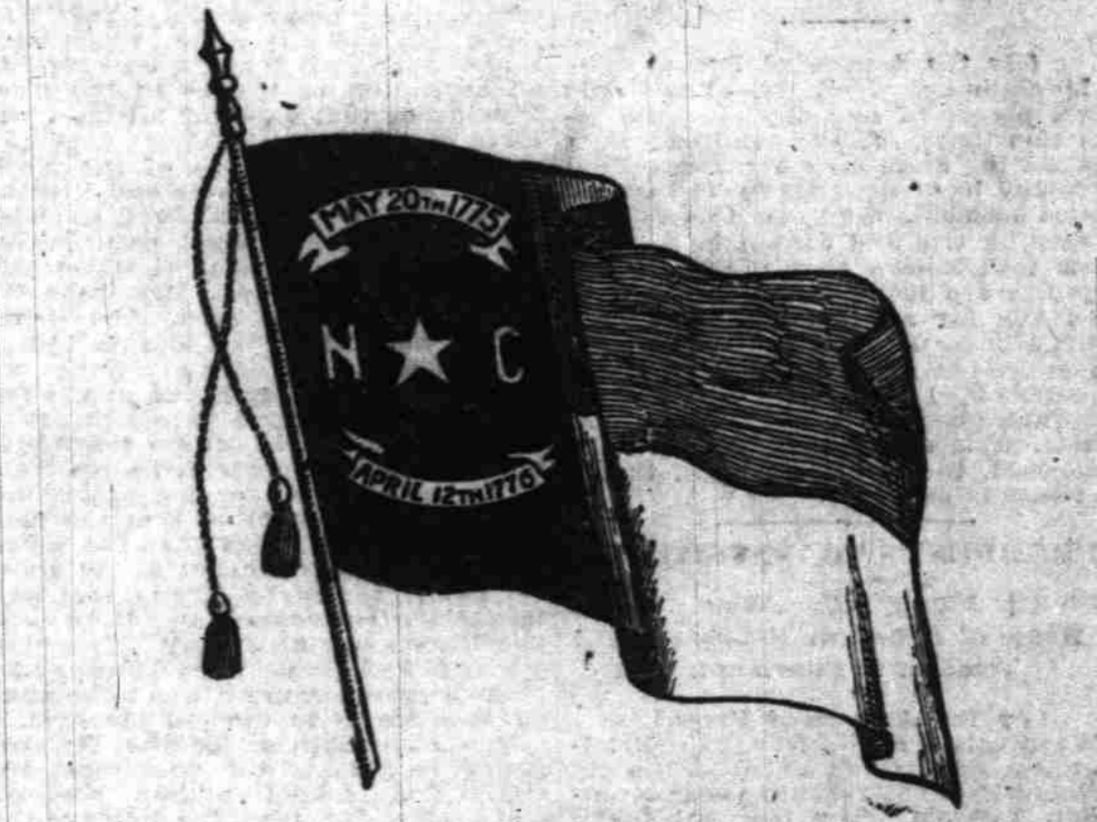

Johnson again redeemed himself by another clever on-side kick. Von Glahn got the ball. Stevens made fifteen yards on a fake kick. Tull gained seven yards and from the thirty yard line Johnson placed his toe squarely against the ball as Stevens placed it and between

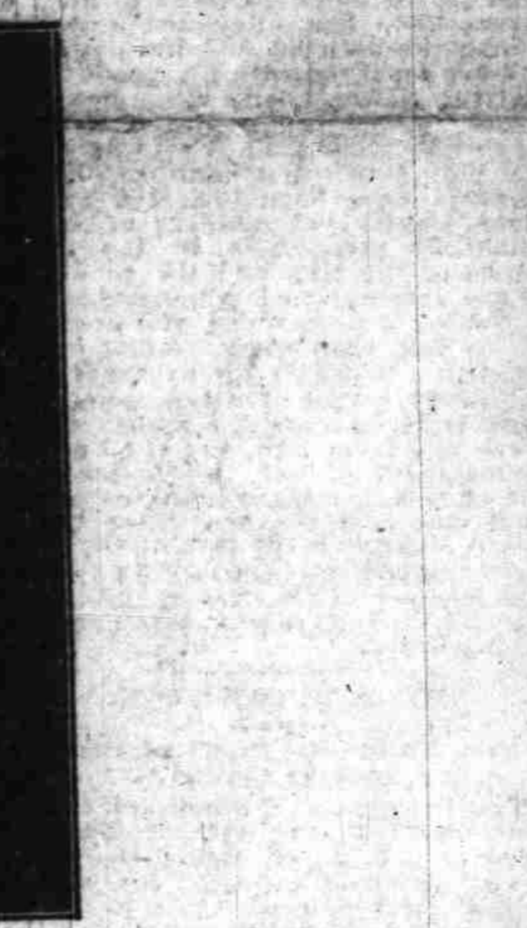


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READS LIKE PROPHECY.

The Men on the Team.

Selfert, A. & M.'s left end, was hobbling last week as a result of collision with the Carolina All Stars, but was all right yesterday. Although a first year man he is one of the best men on the team, and despite his tendency towards a stocky figure he is like the wind when he goes and he gets into everything.

The other left end, R. L. James, is a few inches taller than the 145 pounds of Selfert, and is quick. He has eyes everywhere and his body follows his eyes.

The happy right end is J. O. Sadler, one of A. & M.'s best players and a peer in his position. He has played solidly and with fine action and head work in every game this season. The 160 pounds he carries are muscled into an A1 football man. He is of medium height, and is neither too stocky nor too light.

Reid Tull, the left tackle, is solid and heavy, but not so as to discommodate him in racing across the gridiron. For three seasons he has been one of A. & M.'s prides, and his 181 pounds always are felt in the game.

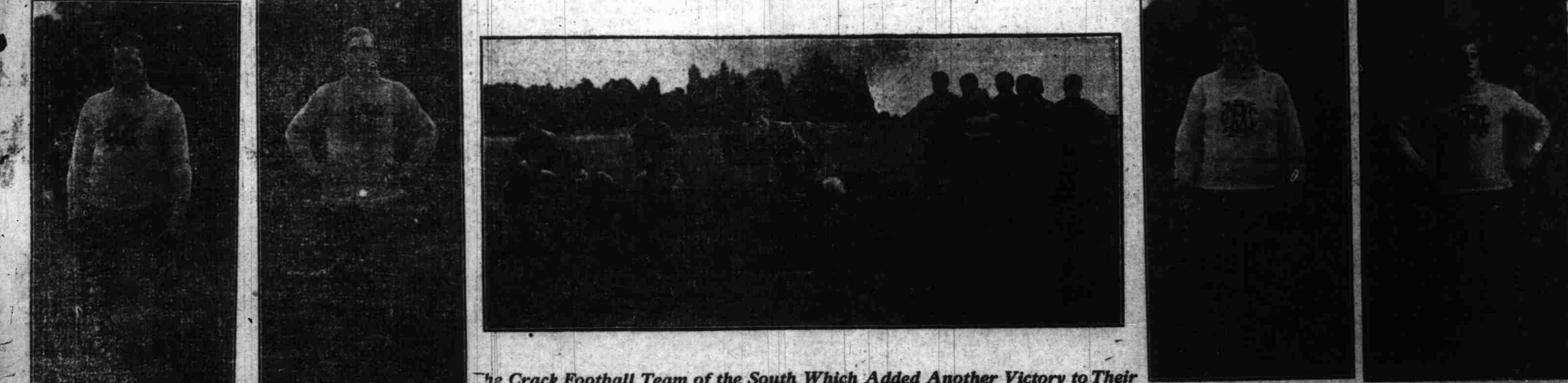
V. Sykes, guard, 202 pounds, solid, steady and long winded, as fast as any man his weight, is making an enviable reputation.
