Negro Prisoner Shot Jailer at Plymouth

People Much Excited and Wrought Up But No Attempt at Lynching-

Militia Kept Guard Through Night.

(Secial to News and Observer.) Plymouth, N. C., Feb. 14 .- Late yesterday evening the reort of a istol was heard three times in the jail. People attracted by the reports rushed to the scene. From within they heard Policeman W. R. White, who is also a legal tender in the paymen jailor, call for help saying, "I am shot."
