GOVERNOR KITCHEN ENDORSED

The People of Randolph Demand that the Corporation Commission Require the Southern to Put Down a Safe Track.

Mr. Elijah Moffitt, of Asheboro, who was here yesterday, says the people of that section approve the refusal of Governor Kitchen to recommend the re-opening of the rate question so that the rate may be fixed by the Corporation Commission. Mr. Moffitt said: "The Corporation Commission already has enough to do, and right now they are trying to get the road from Asheboro to High Point and compel the Southern Railway to put down a safe road bed. About two weeks ago there was a collision between Randleman and Asheboro, and some of the people who came down on the train said there was more rotten ties. The roadbed is understood to be not safe and the people are looking to the Corporation Commission to compel a betterment of the road."
