That at said election the question of the sale of the present municipal building, now used as a market house and known as Metropolitan Hall, together with the land upon which same is located, shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of said That all qualified electors who shall favor the sale of said market house shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words 'For sale of Market House," and all lectors who shall be opposed to the sale of said market house, shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "Against Sale of Market House," and this said election shall be conducted in the same manner, and under the same rules and regulations as are herein provided for the election of city officers.
