FOR A "STATE FOREST."

Over a Hundred Thousand Acres of 6Geo, W. Vanderbilt's Property by Proclamation of Governor.

Governor Kitchin, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 89. Laws of 1909, has issued a proclamation making for thirty years a "State Forest of North Carolina" of all land belonging to George W. Vanderbilt lying above contour line 2,000 feet and situated in the counties of Buncombe Transylvania, Jackson and Haywood totaling 111,445 acres, provided all the necessary provisions of the law are carried out. As a half cent an acre is to be paid to the school fund annually, this will give \$557.73 to the schools of the countles named,

The property to be made into "State Forest of North Carolina" is that situated above 2,000 feet elevation and consists of the following number of acres: Transylvania county, 25,308 acres in Brevard township. 18,510 acres in Gloucester township: Henderson county, 19,754 acres in Mills River township; Haywood county, 1,010 acres in East Fork township Buncombe county, 8,800 acres in Avery Creek township, 4,300 acres in Biltmore township, 5,000 acres in Limestone township, 6,300 acres in Upper Hominy township and 3,500 acres in Lower Hominy township.

The act under which the proclama tion is made is to render secure from damages and notably secure from damages by tires such woodlands in North Carolina as are situated above the contour line of 2,000 feet. These lands so situated are held to be too cold and too humid for successful agriculture, their value being in wood and timber. THE GOLLSBORO UNION DEPOT CASE ON SATURDAY.

Rumor Has it That Norfolk and Southern Will Be Good at Last and Not Wait For Corporation Commis-

sion's Decree. Will the Norfolk and Southern Railway go into the new union depot at Goldsboro without being forced to do so, or will it be good and give the people the accommodation that is

needed? That is the question which Pure Paint Law. For sale by may be answered on Saturday when the North Carolina Corporation Commission takes up the matter again. The union depot has been completed for weeks on weeks and is being used

by the Southern Railway and the Atlantic Coast Line, while the Norfolk and Southern keeps out of it, pleading its receivership and inability to gut in its part of the construction expenses, though at the inception of the depot plans it agreed to "go its third" in the building at Goldsboro.

The matter has been before the Corporation Commission for some time, and a new phase of the matter is on the docket for Saturday. In the face of it there came a whisper yesterday hat the Norfolk and Southern would 10 longer contest the matter but would neet its obligations without further delay and go into the Goldsboro Union epot, paying its pro rata part.

The new phase of the situation is hat the Atlantic and North Carolina tailroad, owned by the State and private parties in the State, now leased to the Norfolk and Southern Railroad, las been cited, through its president Mr. J. W. Grainger, of Kinston, to appear before the Commission and show cause, if any, why it should no be made a party to the proceedings, ind carry out the order of the Commission, as it is its trains which are to go into the union depot. The Norfolk and Southern has plead its being n receiver's hands and in the Fed eral court as a reason why it can't not pay up and put its leased road into he union depot, and the present proeedings are to see that the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad, owned n North Carolina, obey the direction of the Commission, it being the report hat further refused by the Norfolk and Southern may jeopardize its lease of this valuable road from Goldsboro o Morehead City.

The Southern Railway, the Atlantic Coast Line and the Norfolk and Southern were first ordered by the corporaion commission to join the erection of a union depot in Goldsboro and he three agreed, each to bear one hird of the expense. As completed, the depot was found to have cost about \$105,000, and the Norfolk and lantic and North Carolina or the lease of it to the Atlantic and North Carogone into receiver's hands, declined to pay up its one third, later offering o bear one-third of the running expenses and one-third of the interest. The other roads refused this, and the North Carolina Corporation Commission is now taking other steps in the matter, so as to bring the Norfolk and Southern to terms

The newp hase of the matter is being investigated by Attorney-General Beckett, who is now carefully examinng the details of the lease by which he Norfolk and Southern is operating he Atlantic and North Carolina raiload, in order that steps may be taken which will result in the Norfolk and Southern using the Goldsboro union lepot, which it had obligated itself

While the matter is settled the North Carolina Corporation Commission is then to take up the matter of having the Norfolk and Southern arrange to enter the union depot at Raleigh and also to take steps to have the present union depot remodelled and enlarged so that it will meet the requirements of the traveling public.
