To Be Fittingly Observed in Churches

WITH SONGS AND SERVICE

Splendid Music in Raleigh Churches to Tell the Christmas Message, "Christ is Born in Bethlehem"—Glorious Services in Beautifully Decorated Houses of Worship—Special Christmas Sermons.

Tomorrow will be observed in the Catholic and Episcopal churches of the city with appropriate services. Excellent musical programmes have been arranged and the sermons will be in keeping with the day. The churches are being beautifully decorated for the occasion.

Sacred Heart Catholic Church. Tomorrow, the feast of the Nativity of Christ, is a holy day of obligation in the Catholic church. There will be three masses at the Church of the Sacred Heart at 6 a. m., 7 a. m. and 11 a. m., the pastor, Rev. Father Griffin, officiating. At the six o'clock mass there will be special music, "Adest Fideles" and "Hara! What Mean Those Holy Voices?" will be sung, and the Holy Communion will be administered. At 11 o'clock high mass will be celebrated and the pastor will preach the Christmas sermon. In the Catholic church the priest is allowed to offer up the sacrifice three times on Christmas day. The first mass is in honor of the eternal birth of the Son of God; the second in honor of His spiritual birth in the hearts of men, and the third in honor of His birth of the Blessed Virgin.

Midnight Mass at Nazareth. High mass will be celebrated at Nazareth tonight at midnight. During the day tomorrow there will be three masses celebrated and the Holy Communion will be administered.

At Christ Church. With uplifting strains and reverent ceremonial the services at Christ church tomorrow will mount higher and higher until they find their loftiest expression in the great sacrificial act of worship, the Sacrament of the altar. The church will present a beautiful appearance, arrayed for the great Festival of Christ's Nativity. All the accessories of joy will be used to emphasize the meaning of the gift of the Son of God to a world that was lying in sin and darkness.

The first celebration of the Holy Communion will take place at 7:30 o'clock, Rev. Julian E. Ingle being the celebrant.

At 11 a. m. the high celebration begins with the reading of the Epistle. The music at this service will be rendered by a large and well trained choir, with orchestra and organ, all under the direction of Mr. R. Blinn Owen. The offering will be for the general church relief fund.

BOUND OVER FOR PERJURY

STATE ARCHITECTS ADJOURN \$17,000 VERDICT STANDS

Will Meet at Wrightsville Beach July First

Business Matters Were Given Attention to Yesterday and the Session Closed After a Most Successful Meeting.

The Architects' Association of North Carolina adjourned yesterday morning after a most successful session, there being many members present. The sessions were held in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce.

At the session yesterday morning, which was devoted strictly to business, the association determined to hold its next meeting at Wrightsville on the first and second days of July. That will be the annual meeting and at it officers will be elected.

Among the matters discussed at the session yesterday was that of making changes in the law relative to the qualifications of architects. A committee was appointed to take this matter in hand and to report to the State Commissioner J. R. Young.

At the meeting at Wrightsville in July it was arranged to have an exhibit of the work of the various architects of the State, these to show plans and specifications of buildings. The manufacturers are also expected to make an exhibit of value.

After the conclusion of the meeting the members of the association, escorted by Col. F. A. Olds, went on a tour of interest in the city and enjoyed the visit greatly, this being the expression of members of the party. The association has in it representatives of the most progressive life in North Carolina and it has been a pleasure to Raleigh to have the meeting held in this city.

Fausted; their own men, numbering three thousand, are well fed and clothed, but they cannot find means whereby to care for their increased burden.

"I have discussed the seriousness of the situation fully with Captain Shipley, of the Des Moines, and I believe, and suggest that a ship should be sent to Colon immediately to bring here sufficient quantities of the provisions enumerated to feed two thousand men for thirty days. Present situation threatens starvation and disease. It is estimated that over one hundred were killed on both sides."

Cross were issued a warrant to the Prairie to be in readiness to sail at once from Colon with supplies.

SHOT AT FIVE TIMES.
Ernest Braswell Hit in the Arm at a "Box Party" Held by Wilson Negroes.

Wilson, N. C., Dec. 23.—Tuesday night while at a "Box Party," held at the home of Herbert Clark, a mile and a half from Wilson on the Tarboro road, Oscar Barnes, without provocation, shot at Ernest Braswell five times, one shot taking effect in the right arm. A warrant was sworn out for Barnes but it is thought he has skipped to Richmond.

TRAINS RUN IN SECTIONS.
Heavy Holiday Traffic Made It Necessary—Other Trains Late Yesterday.

As the heavy holiday traffic delayed the trains running into Raleigh yesterday, the Seaboard Air Line ran two sections of No. 38, the first reaching Raleigh at 12 o'clock; the second at 1 o'clock. No. 41 was also run in two sections, the first reaching here at 4:35; the second at 6 o'clock. There were also two sections of the Southern westbound passenger train No. 119. The first section arrived on schedule time, 4:05; the second at 5:10 o'clock. On the Seaboard Air Line No. 66 was one hour and thirty minutes late. No. 43 forty-five minutes late. On the Southern, No. 44 was one hour and forty minutes late; No. 22 over an hour late. The Norfolk and Southern, due to reach Raleigh at 11:27 a. m., was about thirty-five minutes late.

NEGRO BURNED TO DEATH
WAS 90 YEARS OLD AND WAS CONSUMED IN FIRE WHICH BURNED HIS HOME.

(Special to News and Observer.) Asheville, Dec. 23.—Hudson Vance, a negro about 90 years of age, was burned to death some time last night when his cottage on the Alexander road, about six miles from here, was destroyed.

The negro, formerly a slave in the Ray family, and also an employe of the late Senator Vance, was living alone on a small farm, which the Rays had given him as his support for life. When assistance reached the burning, the two sections of the train were found in the dying blaze. The fire is supposed to be accidental.

GATEWOOD HELD FOR MURDER
Is Charged With the Death of Arthur Meacham, a Brother-in-Law.

(Special to News and Observer.) Wadesboro, N. C., Dec. 23.—Earl Gatewood has been arrested and is in jail charged with the murder of Arthur Meacham, who died last week as a result of injuries received December 11 at Clio, S. C.

Gatewood is a step-brother of Meacham and was arrested at the instance of William Meacham, another brother.

The three men were at Clio together. Gatewood and Meacham charge each other with being with the dead man when the assault was committed.
