Turner was in fine form, yielding only five scattered hits, and not giving a base on balls. His team mates gave him excellent encouragement by making nice plays and pulling off two fast doubles. Clemens, in these three games with Goldsboro, has shown that he is a hitter to be reckoned with. In every game he hitting has been a feature, and he has gotten a three-bagger in two of the contests and a double in every game.

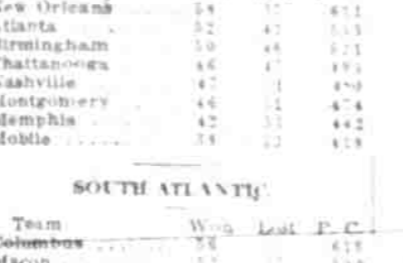
