TWELVE PERSONS KILLED IN WRECK

Eleven Other Persons
Suffer Injuries

WRECK DUE TO A WASHOUT

The Train Running at Full Speed,
Plunges Into Gap, the Engine and
Mail Car Going Into 20 Feet of
Water—The Chair Car Almost Fel-
lowed the Smokey Car—Some
Were Drowned in the Broken
Stream.

(By the Associated Press.)
Clayton, Kans., Sept. 23.—A dozen
persons lost their lives and eleven
others suffered injuries in a wreck to-
day of a westbound Rock Island pas-
senger train running to Denver from
Kansas City. All the injured will re-
cover.

The wreck was the result of a cloud
burst, which carried out a steel bridge
and turned what is normally a dry
creek into a torrent many yards wide.
The water washed out nearly a thou-
sand feet of track also.

The train, running at full speed,
plunged into the gap. The locomotive
and mail car went into 20 feet of
water. The chair car almost tele-
scoped the smoking car ahead of it.
Several passengers in these two cars
were killed almost instantly. Others
were carried into the raging stream
with the wreckage and drowned. It
was many hours before the bodies
could be recovered. Passengers in
the Pullman and the other day coaches
were buried from their berths, or
seats by the shock. Those who were
able to get out of the coaches and
waded what assistance they could to
the injured. Other uninjured pas-
sengers hurried to Clayton, two miles
away, and sent news of the accident to
division headquarters. Within half an
hour physicians, nurses and a
wreck train were hurrying to the
scene from Norton, Colby, and Good-
land, Kansas and Phillipsburg, Neb.
It was nearly night, however, before
the last body was recovered from the
water. The wreckage of the Pullman
and the other day coaches was
scattered all over the stream. The
conductors and the brakemen, all the
trainmen except the car guard and por-
ter. All the slain passengers lived in
Kansas and Colorado.

RIVER STEAMER SUNK

Goes Down in Northeast River—
Loaded Too Heavily With Shingles.

Wilmington, Sept. 23.—News
reached the city this morning that
the steamer Duplin, valued at \$5,000,
was sunk at Broadwater Landing, at
the first bend in the Northeast
river, last night. The steamer was
laden up at the wharf to receive a
cargo of shingles and had just been
loaded. The load was such as to
cause the vessel to be top heavy and
it sank. The boat is owned by Capt.
D. J. Stokes and was in charge of
Capt. John Sellers as master. Prepara-
tions are being made to raise the
steamer.

East St. Louis, Ill., Sept. 23.—After
vigorously denouncing so-called
"Jack Pot" legislation in the draft
of the platform which was presented to
the Illinois Democratic Convention
here this afternoon, the resolution
committee late today eliminated the
word "Jack Pot" from the platform
as originally drafted on the ground
that it was objectionable. The plank
on this subject as originally drafted
read:

The Democratic party is unalter-
ably opposed to the giving or the
taking of bribes by those seeking leg-
islative favors and we condemn in
unmeasured terms "Jack Pot" legisla-
tion. In this connection we wish to
affirm that we favor election of United
States Senators by direct vote of the
people.

The initiative and referendum is

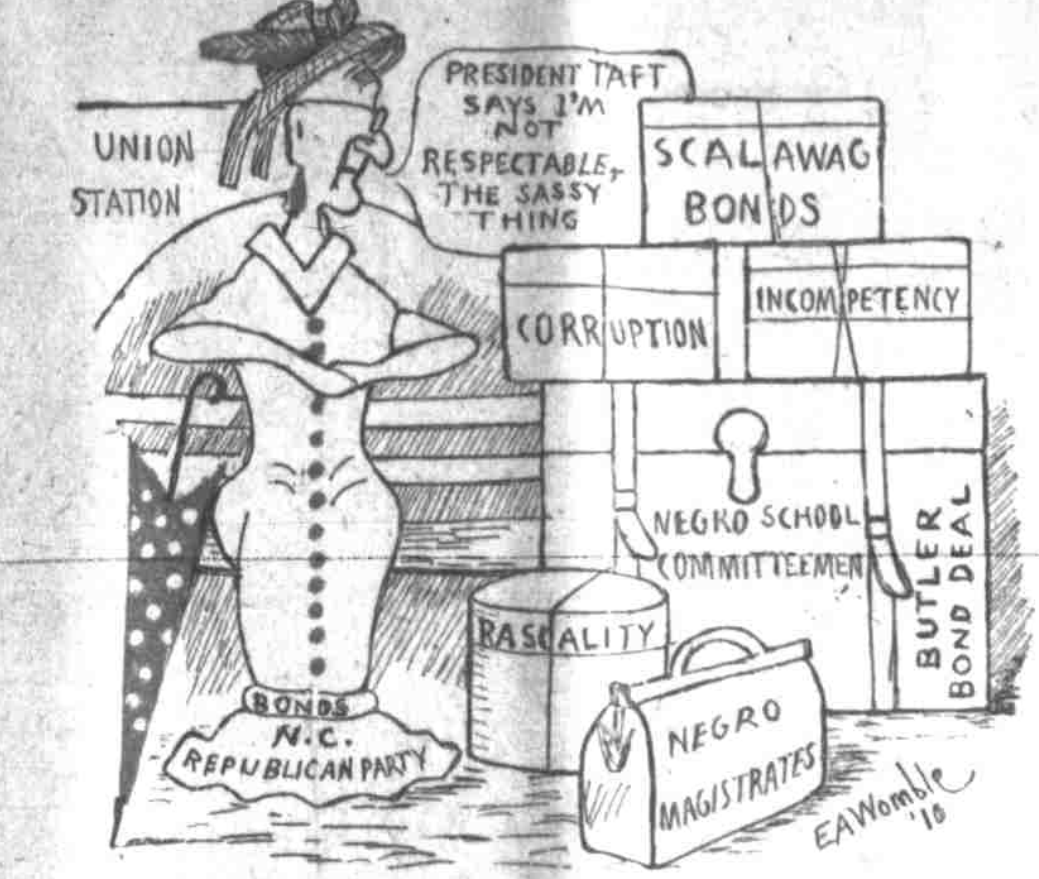

BALTIMORE TAKES SEVENTH
PLACE, GIVING WAY FOR
CLEVELAND, WHICH IS NOW
SIXTH.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 23.—Popu-
lation statistics for the following
cities were made public today:
Norfolk, 67,433, increase 20,833, or
44.7 per cent over 46,600 in 1900.
Portsmouth, 52,190, increase 15,7-
743, or 40.5 per cent over 36,417 in
1900.
Radford, 4,209, as compared with 3,
544 in 1900.
Norfolk county, Va., 52,744, as com-
pared with 46,780 in 1900.
Baltimore, which was sixth city in
the United States in point of popula-
tion in 1900, has lost her position in
the country's great cities, according
to today's census statistics, and now
becomes the seventh city, having in
the last ten years been outstripped by
Cleveland, which takes sixth place.
Baltimore's population is now 553,
448 as compared with Cleveland's
550,445. The Maryland city grew 8.7
per cent in numbers, 49,176, during
the past ten years, having had 441,271
in 1900. Cleveland, which had a
population of 531,122 in 1900, grew
44.9 per cent in the decade just ended.
The population of Savannah, Ga., is
62,544, an increase of 33,313, or 53.9
per cent, as compared with 29,231 in
1900.
