Prosecute All is the Order From Washington, Doc. 13.—A vigorous investigation and prosecution of all-connected with the alleged dynamite conspiracy is the emphatic injunction from the Department of Justice directed to District Attorney Miller, under which he will conduct the Federal which he will conduct the Federal grand jury inquiry beginning at In-

dianapolia tomorrow. District Attorney McCormick, of Los Angeles, who has been here myeral weeks conferring with officials of the Department left tonight for New York on a mission connected with the Government's investigation. Officials, however, decline to discuss the trip in detail.
