Sealed bids will be received at the office of the undersigned at Goldsboro, N. C., until April 2, 1912, at 12 o'clock M., for the purchase of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000) Dollars of Wayne County Drainage District bonds to be issued in accordance with the laws of the State of North Carolina, (Public Act of 1909, as amended by Public Laws of 1911, bearing interest at 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, said bonds payable in ten (10) equal installments; the first installment of principal to be due and shall mature at the expiration of three (3) years from date of issue and one (1) installment for each succeeding year for nine (9) additional years, to be issued in denominations to suit the purchaser, and payable at that time and place as may be designated by purchaser upon acceptance of bid.

These bonds are exempt from all county or municipal taxation of the amount general or special, and the interest thereon shall not be subject to taxation as for income, nor shall said bonds be subject to taxation nor the coupons thereon, when contained as a part of the surplus of a bank, trust company, or other corporation; and are deductible from the assets of such corporation in ascertaining the taxable value of the shares of such corporation.

DRAINAGE

Scaled proposals for the construction of drainage canals in the Wayne County Drainage District, number one, near West Station, North Carolina, will be received by the Board of Drainage Commissioners of said district at Goldsboro, North Carolina, up to 12 o'clock M., April 2, 1912, and at that time they will be publicly opened and read. Each proposal shall be enclosed in a sealed envelope and addressed to the Chairman of the Board of Drainage Commissioners of the Wayne County Drainage District, number one, Goldsboro, North Carolina, and endorsed "Proposal for construction of drainage canals."

Each proposal shall be accompanied by certified check drawn payable to the order of the chairman of the Board of Drainage Commissioners in the amount of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars; this check to be an evidence of the good faith of the bidder, and to be held as liquidated damages in case the award is made and the contract and bond are not entered into promptly. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned as soon as the award is made.

Specifications and blank forms of proposals will be furnished upon application, and a full set of maps, plans and profiles may be seen at the office of the Clerk of the Superior Court, Goldsboro, North Carolina, or at the office of Floyd H.
