The delegates, representing the various counties of the State, have met in a large hall, and have been engaged in a series of sessions, both in the morning and afternoon. The sessions have been marked by a high degree of interest and participation on the part of the delegates. The convention has been a success in many respects, and it is expected that it will result in the endorsement of the State's Senators and Representatives, and of the Governor and State Officers.

The convention adjourned at 6:30 A. M. this morning.
