In And About City

Returns from Tarboro.—Rev. W. M. Whitehead, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, returned to the city from Tarboro, where last week he conducted an evangelical meeting.

Mr. Clarence Poe to Greensboro.—Mr. Clarence Poe, editor of the Progressive Farmer, has gone to Greensboro to attend a meeting in the interest of the State Farmers' Union.

Schumaker Contract.—Schumaker, who played first base for the Winston team last season, has received his contract for this season and returned it to Manager Clancy unsigned. Schumaker says he wants more pay than the club offered him.

Raleigh Monument Committee.—The committee on the erection of the Sir Walter Raleigh monument will hold a meeting at the Citizens' National Bank this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. General J. R. Carr, of Durham, is chairman of the committee.

Injured Man Improving.—Mr. M. T. Norris, who was painfully injured by jumping from a train a short while ago, is still confined to his bed at Rex hospital, though he is slowly improving, and expects to be out in a short while.

Water Used at Fire.—Fire Chief Sherwood Brock estimates the amount of water used at the fire at the Seaboard coal chute Sunday morning at above 400,000 gallons. This was an enormous drain on the reservoir at the pump station.

New Pump Shipped.—A new pump for the water plant has been shipped here from Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and will be put into commission as soon as it arrives. The new pump was to arrive by the first of the year, but there was a delay, and it has not come yet.

To Place Trash Cans.—The new trash cans to be placed on the streets of the city will be put out tonight if the weather be fair. Sanitation Inspector J. Sherwood Uphurburgh has had about fifty new cans here for some time, and these are to be distributed over the city during tonight.

Lecturing in Anson.—Mr. N. C. Newbold, associate supervisor of rural schools, is spending this week in Anson county, where he is visiting some of the schools there. He is being accompanied by Mr. P. J. Kikis, county superintendent of education.

Spend Week in Johnston.—Professor L. C. Brogden, supervisor of rural schools, left last night for Johnston county, where he will spend the greater portion of the week visiting the rural schools there. He will address one or more meetings of the parents of the schools in Johnston.

Condition of Mr. J. A. McLeod.—Friends of Mr. J. A. McLeod, of Charlotte, will be glad to learn that his condition is very much improved since the operation which he underwent more than two weeks ago. Mr. McLeod is county superintendent of education of Moore county.

Col. J. C. Horner Here.—Col. John C. Horner, of Oxford, was in Raleigh on route home from Charlotte. He visited the latter city in connection with the locating of the Military Academy there next term. He says stakes are being driven to mark the site of the first buildings.

Marshal W. T. Borch Here.—United States Marshal W. T. Borch, of Goldsboro, spent a few hours in the city yesterday on business connected with his office here, and returned to his home in the afternoon. Mr. G. L. Borch, deputy marshal, spent Sunday in Goldsboro, at his home.

In Interest of Church.—Rev. L. J. Johnston has returned from Scotland Neck, where he spoke Sunday in connection with raising money for the new Water Street church. About \$300 was raised Sunday, the amount being one-fifth of the sum subscribed by the Ronoake Association.

New Tax Collectors.—Two of three men who will assist Mr. Frank W. Hancock, of Oxford, in the collection of the new Federal income tax in the 53 counties comprising the Eastern District of North Carolina, will be here early next month to take up their duties. Blankets have been mailed, and already several returns have been received at the office here.

Apex Station To Be Replaced.—Passengers on the Seaboard trains yesterday afternoon brought the story that the Southern and the Seaboard, whose union station was burned as they came to Raleigh, will be replaced at an early date. The fire was complete in its destruction, the blaze fighters of the town having no means to extinguish it.

Laying Line of Sewerage.—A line of sewerage extending to all sections of the suburban places on the north is being laid rapidly and water is being supplied far beyond Glenwood. Workmen continue to put down the pipes and within a few months all the houses in these sections will have water easily available.

Confer On Farm Life School.—Prof. T. E. Brown, of the A. and M. College, left yesterday for Durham to confer with Superintendent C. W. Massey, of the county schools, and Prof. Dan T. Gray, county commissioner of agriculture, in the matter of the farm life school in Durham. Though that county lost such a school by vote three years ago, it has built one in spite of those opposing it.

To Attend Trustees Meeting.—Maj. H. A. London, of Pittboro, is in the city and will attend the meeting of the board of trustees in the office of Governor Locke, Craig today.
