But, having no clover on the land, you will need some hitro-gen, especially on the field that was in corn last year, and which should have been in small grain has winter. Hence I would suggest a mixture of-400 pounds acid phosphite, 200 pounds of tankage, and 25 pounds of muriate of potash an acre. As corn roots run all over the ground, L would use this broad-cast before plänting and harrow it in Then get your farm into a regular ro-tation of crops, and stick to it, and always have clover to turn under for corn in the spring, and save the pur-chase of the costly altrogen. Mother Corn Field. "I wish you would advise me the proper fertilizer to use broadcast on a piece of land for corn. It is sandy loam, and made a good crop of peas last year. I think that it will make twenty-five bushels of corn an acre without fartilizer, but I would like to double this yield. I would prefer to apply the fertilizer with a drill before planting. 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


