MAJOR LEAGUE PLAYERS THREATEN BIG STRIKE

President of Player's Fraternity Delivers Ultimatum Saying Contracts Off Wednesday, Account Player Kraft; May Close Parks

Cincinnati, O., July 20.—An unqualified ultimatum that all members of the baseball players' fraternity no longer will consider themselves under contract after July 23, was issued today by August Herrmann, chairman of the National baseball commission.

The letter was written by President David L. Fultz, of the baseball players' fraternity, follows in full: "August Herrmann, chairman National Commission: "Dear Sir: Inasmuch as organized baseball sees fit to continue its violation of section 18, and several other sections of the Cincinnati agreement, which agreement is a part of every player's contract, the board of directors of the baseball players' fraternity has authorized me to inform you that any class A player drafted by the members of the organization will go longer consider themselves under contract."

Shortly after receiving this letter, Chairman Herrmann, as president of the Cincinnati baseball club, called the members of the team together and recited to them his version of the controversy that has arisen. Mr. Herrmann said: "The friction between the National commission and the baseball players' fraternity has arisen over the decision that sent player Kraft to the Nashville class A club. Kraft was originally drafted from Nashville by Brooklyn, then transferred to the Boston Nationals, and later signed a contract with the Newark International League club. Nashville immediately put in a claim for his services under section 9, of what is known as the Cincinnati agreement. This provides that any class A player drafted by a major league club is claimed by the league for league can be claimed by the league. A team from which he was drafted, providing he is sent back to the minor leagues."

The section is practically a condition of section 18, which Mr. Fultz claims we have violated. Section 18 provides that when a player is sent from a major league to a minor league club, he shall first be offered to class A. If a player drafted by a major league club is not wanted there to class A. It has been my contention that this section does not apply to drafted players and I have a letter from Mr. Fultz under date of January 25 in which he says that section 18 shall not apply to drafted players.

I suggested to Mr. Fultz that this case be taken up by a committee from each side. He refused and an amicable agreement reached. Then after the baseball season is over, if it is the desire of the majority of parties concerned that the Cincinnati agreement be so amended as to include drafted players in section 18, it will be one of the first ones to vote for it.

At present with the rules to which Mr. Fultz and the fraternity have agreed the commission cannot see its way clear to award this player to any other club than Nashville.

No Agreement in Contract. In Mr. Fultz's letter he stated that the agreement is a part of every player's contract. I do not believe this is true and I think if you players will go home today and look over your contract you will find that there is nothing of this kind in them.

Now it is my desire to know if you boys, members of the Cincinnati baseball team will no longer consider yourselves under contract to this club after Wednesday. In all fairness to me, I want to ask you to let me know by tomorrow night your decision.

The ball players under contract to our league cannot run the league or dictate the policy of its club owners or officials. The sooner this understood by the players the better it will be for them; otherwise, they will be without employment so far as we are concerned for some time to come.

New Corporations Chartered. The Builders Exchange of Charlotte, without capital stock, was incorporated yesterday by the Secretary of State. The purpose of the company is to promote building and manufacturing interests of that city. Edwin L. Jones heads the incorporators.

Wilmington, July 20.—Organized baseball and the baseball players' fraternity appear to be on the verge of an open breach regarding the signing and disposition of Clarence O. Kraft, who recently declined to obey an order by the National Commission to report from the Newark International League to the Southern Association and was suspended.

The disposition of this player has been the source recently of both correspondence and personal interviews between representatives of the National Commission, the National League and the Players' Fraternity. At a meeting of the board of directors of the Players' Fraternity yesterday President D. L. Fultz, of that organization was instructed to prepare a letter, which is generally termed in baseball circles an ultimatum, from the Fraternity to organized baseball. The letter addressed to August Herrmann, chairman of the National Commission, said unless the demands of the Fraternity in the case of Kraft were agreed to, the members of the Fraternity on and after Wednesday, July 22, would no longer consider themselves under contract.

Johnson Makes Statement. President Ban Johnson, of the American League, today called a meeting of the Associated A. League club owners for tomorrow morning. Johnson today stated that if an order calling for a strike of American League players is carried out, he would cause the immediate closing of all American League baseball parks until such time as the players agreed to return under such conditions and penalties as might be imposed by the league.
