Emblem of Gold Displayed Here Yesterday in Jolly-Wynne Window

GUARDED BY POLICEMEN Raleigh Club Adopts Official Pin at Luncheon Yesterday. Nine New Members Elected. Final Arrangements for "Get Acquainted" Tour East and South of Raleigh

The California Golden Rotary Wheel, valued at \$10,000, displayed in the window of the Jolly-Wynne Jewelry Company store on Fayetteville street, yesterday attracted a great deal of attention. It was placed in the window at 8 o'clock and remained there until 1:30 o'clock, and then, except from 1 o'clock until 2 o'clock, when it was at the Rotary Club luncheon.

While the wheel was in the window it was guarded by Raleigh policemen who stood in front of the store. Officer Warren was the principal officer on duty. For a short time he was relieved by Officer McGhee. At 1 o'clock Officer Warren, assisted by Officer Council, carried the wheel to the luncheon of the club at the Yalborough Hotel and they were guests of the club during the hour.

Wheel Made of Gold. The wheel is made of California gold and is a unique and handsome affair. Between the spokes of the large wheel are seven smaller wheels representing seven Rotary clubs of California. The number of clubs in the State at the time the wheel was made.

Other clubs have been organized in the State since that time. Suspended from the wheel are several chains of small wheels which have been affixed by the Rotary clubs of the cities visited. The Raleigh club affixed its wheel at the luncheon yesterday.

The wheel is on an international tour and will go to every city which has a Rotary club. It will return to San Francisco in time for the opening of the Panama-Pacific exposition.

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HARRY COBB

Chief Walters Goes After Man Who Left Him When He Snoozed at Washington

FOUND AT KNOXVILLE

Cobb's Infatuation for Lena Smith, Now in County Jail, and His Foolhardy Attempts to Communicate With Her His Undoing; Solicitor's Good Luck

Solicitor Herbert E. Norris, Raleigh, N. C., things all K. Will start for Raleigh on twelfth. "C. M. WALTERS." This was the message received in Raleigh yesterday which told the tale that Chief Walters has again met Charles Walter-Smith Harry Cobb, and is again on his way to Raleigh with his prisoner. The meeting took place in Knoxville, Tenn., where Cobb was being held for Raleigh officers.

This happened once before. Chief Walters sent a similar telegram to Solicitor Norris. He was in Washington then. Later he sent another telegram. That said he had missed his train. A last message told of the escape of Cobb in the station at Washington, while the chief snoozed. The State laughed, Chief Walters felt humiliated, and Commissioner King was alleged to have looked about for another chief.

Since that time Solicitor Norris, disappointed and chagrined that the prisoner whom he had located at Danbury, Connecticut, so cleverly should have slipped from his clutches through no fault of his own, resolved highly within himself that he would again bring Cobb into the hands of the law. If hard work would accomplish the feat, and he has done it. Through his efforts, together with the concerted action of Chief of Police Walters, Cobb was rounded up in Knoxville. This occurred Saturday.

Chief Walters asked earnestly that he be permitted to bring Cobb back to Raleigh. This was at length granted and the telegram yesterday bears the information that at least he has left Knoxville, by this time, with his prisoner.

The Way of Man. Wild, unruly, foolhardy infatuation for the girl he left in the clutches of the law in Raleigh was Cobb's undoing. He is a clever man, is Cobb, but not clever enough to curb a desire for information as to the whereabouts and the condition of Lena Smith. Shortly after his get-away from his part of the country, he wrote an appeal to Lena Smith in the county jail. This postcard led directly to his capture in Danbury, Connecticut. Then he escaped and proceeded directly to do the same trick over again.

Certain it is, Chief Walters will not come into the city with brass buttons shining and with big badge prominent. He was warned against it and he heeded the warning.

STRUNK OUT OF GAME WITH DISABLED HAND. Miss Loss Will Be Felt by Athletics. Baker Fails to Understand His Fanning.

Boston, Oct. 12.—Strunk, center-fielder for the Philadelphia club, will be out of the game for the rest of the series if he is unable to play. The Philadelphia players returned from Fenway Park they found Strunk with one hand bandaged because of an abrasion which had been forming for several days. The abrasion was particularly bad on the left hand because up to today he was only one of the American leaguers hitting near true form.

Philadelphia players tonight said they were still hopeful they would even up the series. It seemed to the general opinion among them that the Braves were playing at the very top of their game while the Athletics were far below their usual standard. Baker, in particular, declared he could not understand why he should strike out twice in succession.

CHARGED WITH INFANTICIDE. Brutal Crime Laid at Door of Columbus Negro.

Whiteville, Oct. 12.—Kate Rowland, alias Pittman, a negro woman was arrested at Fairmont today and placed in jail here charged with infanticide.

It is alleged in the warrant that the woman who lives at Clarendon buried her six weeks old child alive Saturday.

The woman claims that the child died of convulsions and having no money or friends dug the grave and buried the child herself.

Negro Killed at Washington. Washington, N. C. Oct. 12.—Neal Blackledge, colored, was killed this afternoon by being thrown from his bicycle by a street car. The victim was riding on the bicycle with his hand on the handlebars when the shifting engine of the Atlantic Coast Line frightened his horse and Blackledge was thrown. His head struck a rail, killing him almost instantly.

BROKE RECORD. Leaf Tobacco Brings Average 14.90 at Wallace.

Wallace, Oct. 12.—A local tobacco warehouse today broke all records for several years by selling leaf tobacco at an average of \$14.90 per hundred, prices ranging from one to thirty dollars. Our entire community is proud of this record.

Warrants for Yegmen. Greensboro, Oct. 12.—Warrants were issued today for James Johnson and T. A. Conway charged with breaking into the postoffice at Siler City last April. They are already in jail here for breaking into the postoffice at Plymouth. Johnson is known as "Fordland Ned."

NIGHT ATTACK MADE ON SUBURBS OF CAPITAL BY ZAPATA'S MEN

Mexico City, Oct. 12.—An attack made on the night of October 10 on San Angel, Xochimilco and other suburbs of Mexico City by adherents of Emiliano Zapata, caused a reign of terror in the capital until today. The attack was relieved when it was officially announced today that Zapata's followers had agreed to cease all fighting until the termination of the peace conference at Aguascalientes, a treaty following the suburbs were satisfactorily adjusted.

The invaders entered San Angel at 7 o'clock Saturday night and heavy fighting was begun. Telephone communication was cut off from the exchange, making communication between the suburb and the city proper difficult. The government immediately impressed a number of the striking street car motormen into service and rushed 1,500 men with artillery to San Angel to reinforce the garrison there. Severe fighting in the streets between the defenders and the attacking party followed. Xochimilco was completely surrounded by Zapata's men and reinforcements also were sent there.

The authorities in Mexico City expressed fear a general attack on families living in Coyocacan and Mixcoacan began moving into the city. BENEDICT V AT BOLOGNA. Italian Methodist Estem for Him as Archbishop There.

It was gleeful singing, and those who sang, as only Italians can do, were vivacious and light-hearted. The Methodist Episcopal church at Bologna was well filled with worshippers. The July sun shone in at the open windows and upon those who sang. From out of the windows the voices of the hymn were carried to others than those who had met in church. There was nothing new about it. That hymn was not only a favorite with the Italian Methodist, but it was also familiar to the neighbors and to the people on the street.

Guarda il forte! Presto lo vengo! Il forte, for, for I am coming! The chorus was caught by outsiders, and while some sang as they passed, others, as they loitered on the sidewalk, uttered the Italian temperately, without regard to religious faith. The martial refrain was agreeable to all.

The visitor from America looked surprised. She had been in Mexico, and at a Protestant chapel the singing of hymns was eliminated from the order of worship or modulated preventing the killing of them. The Mexican authorities, she learned, shot a bear with a revolver. Kolar got within 25 feet of the bear before he saw it. He fired and wounded the animal, which turned and ran, making its escape. SKUNKS LIKE TO BE PETTED. Forty Pretty Little Chicken Thieves Enjoy Human Companionship.

Greenville (Cal.) Dispatch to the San Francisco Chronicle. Greenville has now established one of the most unique industries in the State, namely, the raising of skunks. In the spring Will Stevens, a butcher formerly of Goldfield, rented the F. W. Peck ranch, and entered the business on a small scale. Young skunks were captured in various parts of Indian Valley, and placed in pens. They grew and multiplied rapidly.

The business proved so lucrative that larger pens of corrugated iron were erected, and the number of skunks increased. The skins sell for from \$3 to \$4 each. The oil is also valuable, and is sold to rug makers. Stevens now has large skunks that will be ready for market in a couple of months.

The skunks will eat all sorts of scraps and waste food, but are especially fond of milk and vegetables. They seem to like human companionship, and when called name-to-be petted. To see 40 chicken thieves, with their long white-striped bodies and bushy tails at a trough like so many pigs is an interesting sight.

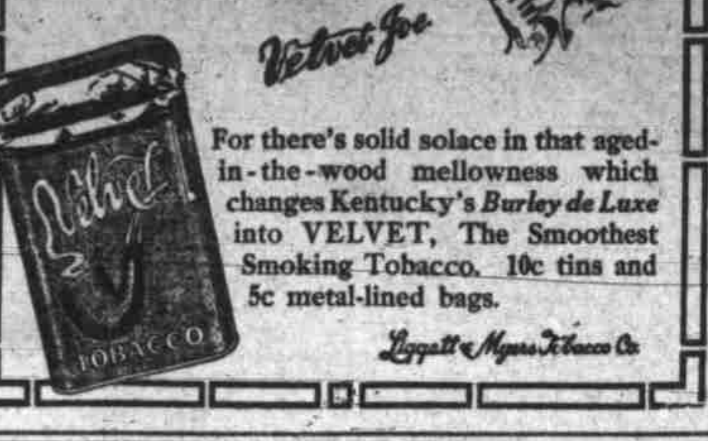

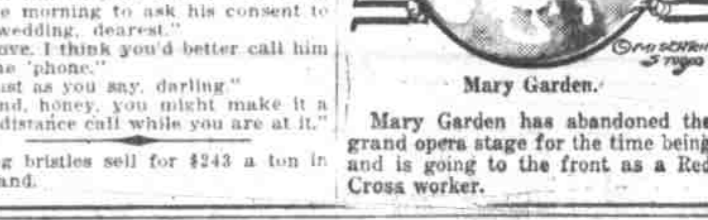
When Newman discovered the robbery he was at loss to explain the burglar's action in leaving the greater part of the money. Later, however, he received the following letter:
