Last Half Century Has Shown Wonderful Increase Along Every Line

Washington, D. C., Nov. 13,-Enormous growth of the United States during the last half-century was shown in a report today, by the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce. Since 1850 the population has than quadrupled, being now than 190,000,000, the report

"In the same period," continued the report, "foreign commerce has grown from \$318,000,000 to \$4,259,000,000,000, and the per capita value of exports from \$16.96 to \$23.27. National wealth has increased from \$7,000,000,000 in 1870 to approximately \$140,000,000,000; money in circulation from \$279,000,000 to \$3,419,000,000,000 and New York bank clearings from approximately \$5,000,000,000 to over \$98,000,000,000 while for the entire country bank clearings have grown from \$52,000,000,000 in 1887, the earliest year for which figures are available to \$174,000,000,000 in 1813. "Evidences of improved social con-"Evidences of improved social con-ditions are also found. For example, 19,000,000 children now are enrolled in public schools and about 200,000 students in higher institutions of learning. Total expenditures for education now approximate \$500,000,000 a year, the result being a rapid increase in general intelligence and a marked decrease in illiteracy. Over 22,000 newspapers and periodicals are disseminating information among the people and the report shows a steady growth in the report shows a steady growth in the number of libraries. In 1850 depositors in saving banks were 251,000 in number; today the num-ber is eleven million, with deposits, exclusive of those in other savings institutions, aggregating \$4,750,000,-000, or more than 100 milesthrdlu 000, or more than 100 times as much as at the middle of the last cen-

"Increased activity on the farms, in factories, and in the great transpor-tation industries also have developed The value of farms and farm propert increased from four billion dollars is 1850 to forty-one billion in 1910; the value of manufacturers. fuom billion to over twenty billion; and the number of miles of rallway in opera-tion from 9.021 in 1850 to 258.033 in 1912. In the last quarter century the number of passengers carried increased from 492,000,000 to 1,004,000,000 and the volume of freight handled from 632,000,000 to 1,845,000,000 short tons. Nearly twenty billion pieces of outgoing mail matter are handled by the postoffice department which disbursed in this important public service last year 262,000,000 dollars, or \$2.70 per capita."

DURHAM SHORT ON MONEY.

However, Bond Issue Floated Withe

Higher Tax Rate.

(Special to The Ness and Observer.)

Durham, Nov. 13.—A forecast of the tax money available for the various departments of the city for the coming year indicate that there will be less money for general purposes. be less money for general purposes than there has been during the past year. The shortage in the general expense fund comes about in spite of the fact that there will be about \$11.000 more in taxes this year than

there was last year.

The shortage is the result of an increase of expenses in other departments of the city government, mainly in the addition of another bond issue, amounting to \$66,000 issued for the purpose of building a sewer plant and line south of Durham. This bond issue was floated without an increase

This shortage means that the aider-men will not be able to do as much street work during 1915 as they did in 1914, unless there are other pro-visions made for this street work, for the money for new construction has to come out of the general fund.

In all probability this will mean that the city will have to issue bonds
