DELIGHTFUL "PEG-O-MY-HEART" TOMORROW BOTH MATINEE AND NIGHT

(By the Press Agent.) The Academy of Music will offer for its second engagement this season Oliver Morosco's delightful comedy "Peg O' My Heart," which comes to the Academy of Music for two performances matinee and night.

The company which comes tomorrow is up to the high standard set by Mr. Morosco for all his attractions, there are ten "Pegs" touring the United States, Australia and Cuba and each of these is under the banner of this well known stage producer.

The matinee doors will open at 2.30 and curtain rises at 3 o'clock promptly, night performance begins at usual hour.

The plot is almost too well known to demand repetition. Sufficient to say that Margaret McConnell, otherwise known as "Peg," comes to the family of her aristocratic aunt, presumably as a guest. According to her uncle's will she is to be brought up in the best traditions of the family, after which she is to be made his heiress.

Her education is so good that she speaks irreproachable English. Her experiences in this aristocratic English family make the drama "Peg's" clearheadedness and common sense saves her cousin from the folly of an elopement. During the course of the play "Peg" says much that is worth listening to, and her Irish humor brings many a laugh.

The role of "Peg" is well taken by Miss Kea Martin, an attractive little figure with her auburn locks and a "bit of the devil-in-the-flesh." To those who have seen Miss Laurette Taylor in this part, which she created, Miss Martin's interpretation lacks little of the refinement and subtlety of the more finished actress. She does not fall in any interpretation.

Miss Clara Miller as "Mrs. Chickadee," the aunt, Miss Helen Hancock as the daughter "Ethel," are very good in their parts. Mr. George Clark does splendid character work in the role of "Xavier," the self-sufficient, bombastic young Englishman, who helped to furnish much of the humor.

Mr. Frederick Meads as "Jerry," was wholly acceptable to the audience as well as "Peg." Although he was not given a place on the program, "Michael," the dog, played a most important part and should not be forgotten.
