If I may be pardoned for speaking well of the living I will say that North Carolnia is fortunate in baving a great Supreme Court: It is of superlative importance to keep it vigorously alive. The best way to lighten the labors of the court would be to have seven justices and let them sit in divisions as is done in many of the States, but this would require a constitutional amendment ire a constitutional amendment recert experience demonstrates that the people do not take kindly to this process. "The work of the court could be materially lessened by providing that in civil actions wherein the amount in controversy does not exceed \$500 an appeal may not be taken as a matter of course, but that in order to bring such a case before the Supreme Court the complaining party must file a pe-tition for a writ of certeorori, and in this petition show to the satisfac-tion of some justice of the court that palpable error in law was committed in the trial below, and that this error resulted in a substantial injustice. I am of opinion that a law to this effect

would be no invasion of the right of the Supreme Court to review any de-cision of the courts below upon any matter of law or legal inforence, but would simply prescribe the method for obtaining such review. I am of opinion that this would relieve the court of one-third of the cases that
