KITCHIN TALKS OF 1916 ISSUES

John Temple Graves Tells About New Party Leader New York American

REPLY TO SENATOR WEEKS

House Democrats, Says Colonel Graves, Believe Claude Kitchin Knows As Much About the Tariff As Oscar Underwood and Maybe More

"Sit down, Senator, sit down." "Don't you know better than to interrupt Claude Kitchin when he is talking on the tariff?"

"Don't you know that every time you interrupt him you make him stronger?" "Don't you know that every question gives him a new place in which to hit the Republican Party?"

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any year in the history of our country. It was \$195,000,000 larger than for the same months under the Payne act for the year ending August 1, 1912, and \$465,000,000 larger than for the same months of the first year of the Payne act.

"There was, on the first day of the first August under the Wilson Administration and Underwood act, an excess over the first August under the Taft Administration and the Payne act of \$66,385,000."

"The working balances in the Treasury offices on August 1, 1912, first year of the Taft Administration and Underwood act, were \$29,551,471, while on August 1, 1914, first year of the Wilson Administration and Underwood act, they were \$72,974,051, two and a half times as much as in the case in favor of the Wilson Administration and Underwood act, of \$44,422,580."

"The gold balances in the Treasury (exclusive of the \$150,000,000 reserve for redemption of the United States notes) were: On August 1, 1912, \$118,747,666. On August 1, 1913, \$12,730,325. On August 1, 1914, \$8,421,483."

"But on August 1, 1914, under the Wilson Administration and Underwood act, the gold balance was \$139,551,554."

"It will be noted that, while there was an excess of the Wilson Administration and Underwood act over each of the Taft Administration and Payne act, the excess of the Wilson Administration and Underwood act over the first year of the Taft Administration and Payne act was \$72,974,051."

"There is no truth in this charge. The fact is, that, exclusive of the post office appropriation act, for which Senator Weeks voted every Republican in the Senate and House voted, we appropriated for the current fiscal year, ending June 30, 1915, being the first and only year's appropriation under the Wilson Administration, \$17,238,000 less than the last annual appropriation under the Taft Administration."

"What support for extravagance we have had made under the Taft Administration, why should a Republican complain? With what propriety did he make the charge of extravagance? On every Appropriation Committee of House and Senate the Republicans have the requisite majority. Not a minority ever has a proposed appropriation of a single Republican member of a single Appropriation Committee was made against a single dollar appropriation under the Wilson Administration, and every one of the appropriations acts, the charge, now, of Democratic extravagance is one of pure ignorance or hypocrisy."

"Senator Weeks says, 'The main trouble with business is the uncertainty which surrounds it.' That, in his opinion, the Taft Commission bill, which passed last year, after a long time of consideration, will accentuate this condition, and he attempts to make an issue with the Wilson Administration on this act."

"We understand that the business interest—and the Clayton Anti-Trust Act and the Trades Commission Act were intended to remove and would remove the uncertainty which the Taft and Underwood Administrations had surrounded business. These acts made certain and clear the business activities of legitimate business."

"What how can the Senator or his party make an issue with the Wilson Administration and the Democratic Commission Act when it received the vote of every Republican in the House, and only five Republican votes in the Senate were received against it, neither of which Senator nor his colleagues, Senator Lodge, voted against it?"

"As for the Clayton Anti-Trust Act, the chief objection to the House, on the part of the Republicans, was that it did not go far enough, and did not strike the big interests and big business hard enough; that it was too gentle with them."

These bonds will be received by the town of Wilson, North Carolina, until Tuesday, March 5, 1913, at 7:30 p. m., for eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000), five per cent (5 per cent) coupon bonds.

These bonds will be issued under authority of an act of the General Assembly of North Carolina, Session 1910, and ratified on this 15th day of February of the said year.

The bonds will be in denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each and interest will be payable semi-annually, April 1st and October 1st, each year, with principal and interest payable at the office of the treasurer of the town of Wilson, or at some bank in North Carolina, at the option of the purchaser.

The bonds will be dated April 1, 1913, and payable as follows: Thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) on April 1, 1921, and five thousand dollars (\$5,000) each year up to and including 1924—time, sixteen years (16) from date thereof.

DURHAM CHARTER CAMPAIGN.

Only Two Weeks Until Election on Municipal Form.

Durham, Feb. 28.—The next week the campaign for the adoption of the municipal form of government, as embodied in the new city charter, will be on in earnest. It is the intention of the charter committee to have at least twenty speakers appear before the public during the two weeks to March 16, when the election will be held.

The first step in the campaign was the distribution of the printed copies of the charter. These have been in the hands of the voters since the first of the week. A number of citizens have sent in articles to the daily papers favoring and opposing the new charter.

The citizens' campaign committee believe that the biggest portion of the opposition to the new charter will come from ignorance of the real purpose of the new instrument of government and they consider the education of the people to the real meaning of the charter to be the most important job before them. In order to do this speakers will be sent into every nook and corner of the town.

The people have been asked to read the charter and to prepare to ask any question they wish when these meetings are held. The speakers have also offered to meet in joint debate any of those opposed to the charter.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS AND SEWERAGE.

Kinston, N. C. Sealed proposals will be received by the City Council of the City of Kinston, N. C., at the City Hall in Kinston, N. C., until 5 p. m. March 23rd, 1913, for Street Improvement and Sewerage.

The work will consist of about: 12,000 sq. yards of more of Brick, Asphalt, Bituminous, or other pavement. 30,000 linear feet of concrete Curb and Gutter. 20,000 square yards of sidewalk. 3 miles of 36 inch pipe sewers. Proposals must be marked: "Proposal for Street Improvements, or Sewerage."
