tary condition. He was acquitted next morning before the recorder. Chief Justice Clark states: We need not, however, consider the debated proposition (imprisonment in unsanitary lock-up) whether the city under such circumstances would be liable for damages because plaintiff was arrested for a violation of the State law and his being placed in the city lock-up was without its authority, express or implied, but was the unauthorized act of the defendant Howland. Such action by Howland, imposes no liability upon the city, any more than if he had imprisoned the plaintiff in a place not to have been the same here, save that would not have imposed any liability upon the owner of the lot, without his concurrence in the act. Upon emergency, which does not appear to have been the case here, one may be arrested without a warrant. Rev. 3178-8, but as soon thereafter as possible, the warrant must be procured. Rev. 3182. This was found by the jury not to have been the case here. The action of Howland being unauthorized created no liability as to the city. Notwithstanding as to the Washington should have been granted. As to Howland, no error.
