Representatives of Companies Hold Meeting With Commissioner J. R. Young

Representatives of the North Carlina fire insurance companies were here yesterday in conference with Insurance Commissioner James R. Young with the purpose of getting in shape to operate with the State De-partment in enforcing the new fire incurance law adopted by the last

Legislature.

Among the insurance men here for the conference, which was held in Commissioner Young's office and lasted pretty much all day were: M. S. Witlard, of Wilmington; H. R. Bush and A. W. McAlister, of Greensboro: W. S. Wilkinson, of Rocky Mount; Eugene Chisholm, of Charlotte; Alex Webb and R. S. Bushes of Raleigh.

Some of the provisions of the law affecting fire insurance went into effect April 1, others go into effect July 1 and still others will go into effect. Jan 1. There is said to be a great deal of detail work in inaugurating the provisions of the new act.

"The law will prove a good thing for both the companies and the policy holder." said Mr. M. S. Willard, of Wilmington discussing the recently enacted measure. For one of the things principally aimed at is the prevention of fire waste and prevention means cheaper rates for the policy-holder and fewer losses for the companies. In fact, I do not see any way to get cheaper rates except through the medium of preventing needless.

One of the ways, and the principal way by which the new law will operate to prevent fires, is the requirement which is imposed that the companies affix to policies the information as to why rates are advanced over basic figures. Under the law a list of the deficiencies which result in the companies are advanced to the deficiencies which result in the companies are attached to the list of the deficiencies which result it higher insurance is attached to the policy and the insurance men believe that when the policy holder begins to see that the presence of defects in his building is costing him money he will get busy and correct the de-fects.

If the new law is carried thoroughly, it is said that North Car-olina will be ahead of any State in the union in fire insurance legislation.
