Case of Alfred S. Wyllie, Trustee, Against The Cone Export and Commission Co.

FAIR HAS SPELLING BEE

Eik Event at Greensboro Being Largely Patronized; Firemen Reelect Old Officers; Chairman Boren, of County Commissioners, Issues Statement

(Special to The News and Observer.)

Greensboro, April 12.—Superior court this morning took up the case of Alfred S. Wyllie, trustee of the Trollinwood Manufacturing Company, against The Cone Export and Commission Company, in which the plaintiff is suing for more than \$30,000 claimed by the plaintiff to be owing to the estate of the bankrupt on account of certain deliveries of manufactured cotton goods prior to the time the Trollinwood company, of Haw River, went into bankruptcy two or three years ago.

The Cone company was the selling agent of the Trollinwood company and from time to time as the Trollinwood company manufactured cotton goods they were delivered to its selling agent, and money was advanced by the Cone company. The latter received something like \$60,000 in manufactured goods just prior to the bankruptcy and advanced about \$32,000. The amount claimed in the difference, which it was alleged was a preference on account of being applied to other accounts than those within the four months. The case is being warmly contested. The plaintiff is represented by Messrs. S. Brown Shepard, of Raleigh; A. M. Scales and J. A. Barringer, of Greensboro, and the Cone company is represented by Messrs. King & Kimball and J. H. Fou, the latter of Raleigh. The case will go to the jury tomorrow morning.

Charity Fair a Success.

An old-fashioned spelling bee was conducted at the Eik charity fair to-night, was participated in by a number of people and was greatly enjoyed. The fair is being largely patronized by people of the city. There are many attractive booths, much has been given the committee and it is expected that a handsome sum will be realized for the charity fund. This afternoon a special program was given at the Piedmont theatre and half of the proceeds went for the benefit of the Eik fund.

Firemen Reelect Officers.

At an enthusiastic meeting held last night the Greensboro firemen reelected the old officers, as follows: F. N. Taylor, chief; E. E. Bain, assistant chief; H. C. B. Guthrie, secretary, and E. L. Clarke, treasurer. The Greensboro department has only a few paid men, but those who are volunteers are very enthusiastic and are very regular and faithful in the performance of their duties.

Feels of Court House Plans.

Chairman W. C. Boren, of the county board of commissioners, has issued a formal statement in which he outlines what the commissioners propose to do if the \$250,000 court house bonds are voted by the citizens of the county. The purpose is to erect on the present court house site a building that will be large enough for the needs of the county for decades to come, and which will also have considerable space to rent, and which will yield to the county an income sufficient to pay a part of the cost of the building and compensate the county for the valuable property occupied by the court house. This new court house will probably be ten stories or more high, though Mr. Boren says frankly that the commissioners have not decided this upon just the character of the building, except that it will be a combined court house and business building, several stories in height and of a creditable architectural design.

Announcement was made that notice will be given through the papers when the board will be ready to receive applications for registration and examination.

GREAT REVIVAL AT LENOIR

Rev. J. F. Deal, Pastor of Lutheran Church, Lenoir, Va.
Lenoir, April 13.—The revival services which began at the First Methodist church a week ago are creating an interest unparalleled in the religious history of the town. At the service on Sunday morning, it is estimated that at least one hundred and fifty persons gathered at various times around the altar and in the aisles in response to the call for penitents and some one hundred and twenty-five made a profession of faith.
Rev. W. M. Biles of Newton is assisting the pastor, Rev. Z. E. Farhardt in the meeting and he has been doing the preaching.
Rev. J. F. Deal, who has been pastor of St. Stephen's Lutheran church here for the last three years, has tendered his resignation to take effect on the 1st of May. Rev. Mr. Deal has rendered faithful and efficient service to the church here and not only will the membership but the entire citizenship of the town will regret to see him take his departure. He has not yet decided where he will go after leaving the work here.
The Blowing Rock Line, a corporation engaged in the carrying of passengers between Lenoir and Blowing Rock, which was sold some time ago to A. W. DeLa by T. C. Robbins and C. E. Robbins, has again changed hands, having recently been taken over by Messrs. W. L. Erbes, A. D. Winkler and T. D. Moore, Jr., the present owners of the Lenoir Livestock Company. 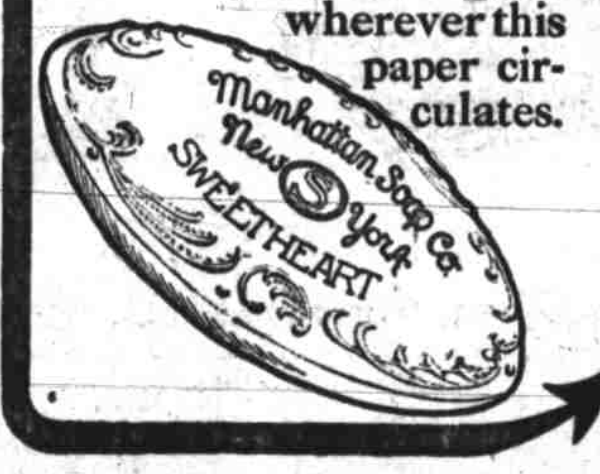

TO NAME NON-PARTISAN TICKET

Storm Which Passed Over Mt. Airy Did Much Damage.

Mt. Airy, April 12.—Your correspondent is in error as to the ticket to be nominated Thursday night, the 16th. It is a meeting of the citizens that has been called to meet who are talking up chances of R. T. Joyce and S. E. Marshall for mayor. They are desirous of putting out a non-partisan ticket instead of a Republican ticket. Every one can rest easy. Mt. Airy is sure to get good men no matter who is nominated.
The storm that passed over this city Sunday at noon was terrific and much property was destroyed. Mr. S. C. Franklin was the greatest sufferer in this section. The wind destroyed his barn, silo, etc., the loss being over \$500. Two box cars standing in a long string of cars at the depot were unroofed and a number of barns, out-buildings, etc., in town were blown down. So far it is not known as to the extent of damage to the tobacco plants, as great quantities of hail fell during the storm. At one time it looked as if a great cyclone had struck the city, but it lasted only ten minutes.

BIG INCREASE IN COMMENCEMENTS

Estimated That Over 100,000 Children Will Have Participated at the End

When all the reports are turned in to the State Department of Education between sixty and seventy counties of the State will have held county commencements this year. This is the estimate of Mr. L. C. Brogden, State Agent for Rural Schools, who has been attending county commencement all over the State.

Last year county commencements were held in forty-one counties of the State, and practically 75,000 school children participated in parades, contests, school exhibits and exercises. Already county after county has lined up this year for a county commencement for the first time, and without an exception they have been held or will be held in all those counties which last year saw the good effects of the educational demonstration.

Recently Mr. Brogden has attended county commencements in four counties, Granville, Forsyth, Surry, and McDowell and in these counties he gave certificates of graduation to 4,400 pupils to an aggregate of two hundred and ninety children.

On Friday, he will be at Swan Quarter in Hyde county where he will make an address at the county commencement.

GREAT EFFICIENCY URGED

Memphis, Tenn., April 12.—Greater efficiency in the operation of mills, closer relations between the different interests involved, and the upbuilding of the coal tar dye industry in the United States were urged at the annual meeting here today of the American Cotton Manufacturers Association as essential to the success of the cotton goods industry in this country.

Joseph T. Rose, of Atlanta, told the textile manufacturers that "many cherished ideas of the only way to succeed" should be given up in the interest of efficiency. He advocated the employment of efficiency experts by all of the mills.

T. L. Hickman, of Augusta, Ga., president of the organization, and E. C. Kipstein, of New York, were the other speakers today. Reports will be read and officers elected tomorrow.
