SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS TO HOLD FIRST MEETING

General Welcome Extended in Tabernacle Church Tonight at Eight-thirty

DELEGATES TO ARRIVE ON AFTERNOON TRAINS

After Whirlwind Campaign On Sunday Afternoon By Committee On Entertainment Practically Enough Homes For Eight Hundred Delegates Have Been Secured; Opening Tonight Will Be Accompanied By Music and Brief Speech-making

A routing welcome to all the delegates of the Fifth Annual Convention of the North Carolina Baracas-Philatheas Association will initiate a four day session of that organization in the Tabernacle Baptist church tonight at eight o'clock.

For weeks the committees on various forms of entertainment and details of the convention have been hard at work. After a whirlwind campaign conducted in a number of automobiles on Sunday in which the committee visited a great number of the homes of the city of Raleigh, practically all the eight hundred delegates to the convention have been arranged for.

The morning trains and the afternoon trains of today will bring into the city such a throng of the young men and women of the State who "do things" as Raleigh has not recently seen. Eight hundred set down for the coming is a conservative estimate. It is fully expected, however, that the attendance upon the convention will reach far into the thousand mark, particularly on next Sunday when a large general entertainment of Baracas and Philatheas will be held in the Raleigh auditorium.

At the union depot today the committee on registration, J. D. Berry, Prof. J. E. Allen, and Mrs. W. C. Norden, will take charge of the delegates as they arrive and assign them to the homes which have been provided. The committee has requested that the people of Raleigh who have agreed to entertain delegates be prepared to receive them this afternoon.

It is anticipated on account of the fact that this is the day set for the opening of the Raleigh baseball season and the opening game for the Carolina League, that there will be a scarcity of conveyances at the time the delegates arrive.

At eight o'clock tonight those delegates who are present and the hosts of the Baracas-Philatheas in Raleigh will gather in the Tabernacle Baptist church to hold a general re-acquaintance and welcome meeting. At this time there will be an address for the city of Raleigh, by Mr. Joseph G. Brown; for the churches, by Dr. T. W. O'Kelley; of the First Baptist Church; by the Sunday Schools, by Mr. J. M. Broughton, Jr.; for the Baracas, by Mr. H. A. Bland, president of the Raleigh Union.

Then will come a response to the welcome on the part of the Association by Rev. Fred Collins of Clinton. It will be followed by one minute greetings from the State officers and committeemen.

Music will also feature this first meeting. Bands and orchestras which will render several selections; a chorus under the direction of Prof. Gustav Hagedorn will be one of the musical attractions.

CANDIDATES SAY THEY WILL STICK

Children of State School for Blind Enjoy Hospitality of Mr. J. G. Ball.

Not on this earth were there twenty-eight happier children than the kindergarten class of the State School for the Blind yesterday afternoon, as the guests of Mr. Jesse G. Ball, and they had their first automobile ride and a great outing at Edwards Mill, five miles out of town on Crabtree Creek. They were taken out in Mr. Ball's auto truck and automobile with Miss Troy their teacher in charge, and she fully shared every pleasure they had.

There was the ride, through the woods part of the way, with the dogwood showing white, and through the field with many an acre of vivid green grain. At the mill there was the stream, the miniature mountains and the flowers, and in the meadow the children made a ring, while their kind host served ice cream and cake.

Then they played games and Col. Oida, who happened to be in the party, told Indian and fairy stories. Miss Troy said it was the very greatest afternoon the kindergarten class had ever had, and she was really afraid that they would not be able to sleep so keen was their pleasure. They had been looking forward to just the right day for the big event and they certainly got it yesterday.

TWO FIELD DAYS FOR THE CHILDREN

Plan On Foot To Have Playground Events For Benefit of The Public

At a meeting of the Merchants' Association tomorrow night, Mr. L. E. Lashman, supervisor of the children's public playgrounds, will explain his plan to have field day exercises on May 19th and 20th. It is expected the aid of Raleigh merchants will be enlisted to help push the events and bring hundreds of people to the city from surrounding towns. On these days the playgrounds usually receive excursions to Raleigh and this is expected to be an added inducement for people from the surrounding towns to come to the Capital. May 19th is Memorial Day and is generally observed as a Southern holiday. The Fourth of July comes this year on Sunday, so it is likely either the third or fifth will be chosen. It is tentatively planned to have athletic exercises by the children in the morning and then give way to baseball in the afternoon. Raleigh is scheduled to play in Durham on Memorial Day and here on the morning of July 5th, but it is likely that the plan will be worked out so as to give visitors a chance to see a ball game in the afternoon. The athletic events of the morning will be free to all, and are expected to draw more attention from the public to the playground movement.

Tomorrow night the Merchants' Association will also nominate officers for the ensuing year.

AGAIN WITHOUT POWER

Storm Plays Havoc With Wires Out of Blewitt For Over An Hour.

Just for a while yesterday afternoon Raleigh again experienced the sensation of being without electric power. From about five o'clock until after six, the current was lacking. From the plant of the Carolina Power and Light Company at Method it was explained that the trouble was with the high tension wires from Blewitt, and that there appeared to be a heavy storm in that direction and a display of lightning.

The current was off the high tension wires at 5:07. At 6:20 the steam plant of the Carolina Power and Light Company of Raleigh was got into operation and at 6:40 the high current came on again.

HEALTH BOARD TO TAKE PART

Big Meeting of Health Men in Asheville During Month of May

The North Carolina State Board of Health will participate in the annual meeting of the South Eastern Sanitary Association which will be held this year in Asheville on May 25-26. Dr. W. S. Rankin yesterday received an invitation to make an address on the occasion of the meeting, but the rush of matters of the State Board made it necessary for him to decline the invitation. However, Mr. Warren H. Booker, Assistant Secretary of the Board, will be there and will handle the exhibit of the State Board of Health, which took the prize at the Jacksonville convention of the American Public Health Association.

This association was organized in May of 1913 as a result of the Municipal Sanitary Congress which was held in that city. There were present for the organization health officers and sanitary authorities from four States, besides the representatives of the United States Navy, the United States Army, the United States Public Health Service and the United States Department of Agriculture.

At the approaching meeting in Asheville, all the municipal health officers, members of State and municipal boards of health will be invited to attend. Likewise there will be a number of exhibits from municipal and State health boards for the occasion.

Speakers before the association will be composed of some of the foremost authorities on public health in the South. Some of the speakers will be the following: Dr. Hayne and Dr. Cowan, of Columbia; Dr. Davis Furman, of Greenville; Dr. C. E. Terry, of Jacksonville; Dr. E. C. Levy, of Richmond; Dr. E. A. Hines, of Seneca; Dr. William Egleston, of Hartsville, S. C.; and Dr. Ernest Kelly, of the Dairy Division of the United States Department of Agriculture.

He left the car to be towed in, jumped into another automobile standing by and hastened to the bedside of Mr. Woodard.
