

V.M.I. TEAM PLAYS CAROLINA TO TIE

Field Goal By Tandy Is Chapel Hill Eleven's Only Score of Contest

 Greensboro, Oct. 23.—Neither Carolina or Virginia Military Institute won an expected victory this afternoon, the game ending in a tie. Field goals for the two teams gave a score of 3 to 3.
 Neither goal was in serious danger during the game, though Carolina one time lacked only a few yards of a touchdown. Carolina scored first, Tandy driving the ball between the goal posts in the first quarter from the 42-yard line. McCormick made the other score on a drop kick from the 20-yard line in the second quarter. Bertchy had an opportunity for a drop kick, but the ball went to the right. Carolina showed up best in the use of the forward pass. Tandy's punting featured. Captain Neime suffered a broken rib in the second quarter. Only four of the regular Carolina team was in the game. The attendance was good.

DARTMOUTH FAILS TO SHOW USUAL STRENGTH

 Princeton, N. J., Oct. 23.—Dartmouth did not show her expected football strength and was overwhelmed by Princeton in their annual game in Palmer stadium today 30 to 7. It was the second time the Tigers were scored on this season, her line being crossed today near the end of the game on a forward pass. Bookert, a halfback, Tibbett of the Princeton team, was the star of the game, he contributing half of Princeton's total points. In the first period he scored two goals from the field. In the third he broke through the Dartmouth line for a touchdown and also kicked all Princeton's goals following her three touchdowns.

Excepting the fine exhibition given by Tibbett, the game was not a brilliant one, it at times being listless and somewhat uninteresting. Princeton's punting as a rule was much better than that of Dartmouth, which enabled the Tigers to bring the ball within striking distance to make a score.

Dartmouth showed to best advantage in the final period when Princeton, far ahead, ran in second and third string men.

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CORNELL GIVES HARVARD SURPRISE

Crimson Players Awaken to Power of Cornell Attack Too Late

 Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 23.—Cornell caught Harvard napping today and won a well-deserved victory by a score of 19 to 6. Before the Crimson players had awakened to the power of the Cornell attack, Captain Mahan had made a costly fumble, another Harvard player was caught off side and Barrett, the Cornell captain had scored the only touchdown of the game within five minutes after the start. A field goal by Shiverick in the last period from the 42-yard line ended the scoring. It was the first football victory ever scored by Cornell over the Crimson and the first Harvard defeat in four years.

Harvard was never nearer than 25 yards to the Cornell goal. The only drop of bitterness in the Cornell cup of joy was the injury of Captain Barrett. Five minutes after he had scored his touchdown he stopped Mahan in the middle and suffered a severe blow in the head that he was unconscious for several minutes.

W. AND J.'S QUICK PASSES COMPLETELY PUZZLE YALE

 New Haven, Conn., Oct. 23.—Washington and Jefferson's splendid eleven used five minutes after the opening precision today and huddled Yale 14 to 7 in a spectacular contest. It was the second successive year that the team from the little Pennsylvania college registered a defeat over the Blue.

The visitors' assault was so varied that Yale was completely bewildered. The pass was always thrown in a machine-like manner; there was nothing haphazard about the play. This is strongly shown in the analysis of the game, the victors completing 22 out of 24 attempted passes.

Washington and Jefferson drew first blood in the second period when Moore scored a goal from placement from the 33-yard line. In the third period a series of forward passes brought the ball to the 19-yard line. On the next play Nuss skirted left end for a touchdown. In the final period more forward passes brought the leather to the 10-yard line. Then McCright nonchalantly hurried the ball fur over the line into the waiting arms of Heyman, with no Yale man near.

Yale made its touchdown in the last few minutes of play, when Scovil, who played brilliantly throughout the game, recovered a fumbled ball on the visitors' 19-yard line and raced over the line.

TIBBETT'S KICK CUTS OFF DEFEAT

Apparently Beaten, Virginia Wins From Georgia in Last Minute of Play

Athens, Ga., Oct. 23.—Virginia's football team defeated Georgia here today on a play that was in process of completion when the final whistle was blown. Tibbett, a substitute halfback, drop kicked from Georgia's 20-yard line, in almost the last second of play and as the ball soared between the goal posts time was called. Tibbett's calmness and accuracy under the most trying circumstances, Virginia owes her 9 to 7 victory.

Tibbett's feat came after he had done most of the Virginia work in the final period. He got his chance late in the third quarter, replacing Anderson. In the fourth he was sent around the ends and to hit the line and gained time after time. Finally he was called upon to drop kick and did it.

The defensive work of both teams overshadowed their offensive. After the first period, in which each scored, it was a hard struggle with both sides resorting frequently to kicking. Early in the first period Powell intercepted a Virginia forward pass and with good interference ran 80 yards for a touchdown. Henderson kicked goal. Mayes and Anderson then swept around the Georgia ends for long gains and finally Mayer pushed the ball over the line. He failed to kick goal.

In the next two periods neither side could make considerable gains. In the last quarter, however, the strain began to tell on the Georgians, while Virginia fought desperately. The ball was in Georgia territory most of the fourth quarter and finally was worked to a point where Tibbett could save the day for Virginia.

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RALEIGH HIGHS BEAT WARRENTON

Local Eleven Victorious in First Home Game of Season, Thirteen To Nothing

Warrenton Highs were unable to cope with the superior training, fast attack and splendid defensive work of Terrill at center, and yesterday afternoon lost to the Raleigh high school eleven, 13 to 0. In the first high school game of the season on the local gridiron. The contest was staged on Riddick Field and was witnessed by a fairly good crowd.

Displaying an attack and defense characteristic of past high school teams, the Raleigh boys were soon on their march to the visitors' goal line after the Warrenton high lost the ball before making their initial first down. Plunges over tackle by Chapman, Hotchkiss and Daniels with an occasional end run by Mills placed the ball on Warrenton's 16-yard line early in the first period. A few minutes later Chapman went through the line for the first touchdown. Hotchkiss failed to kick goal.

After this touchdown and though the remainder of the game the ball was worked up and down the field, each team making required distance but being forced to punt when near each other's goal.

Raleigh had several chances to score, but the only time they succeeded in threatening was in the third and final periods. In the third after working the ball gradually closer and closer to the visitors' line, Champion broke through the line, evading the Warrenton backs and ran 20 yards for his second touchdown. Mills kicked goal this time.

The Warrenton boys found it easy to gain through the line at times but the locals always rallied when the visitors threatened to make much headway in gaining and forced a punt. The Warrenton high could make practically no gains around the ends and either lost ground or failed to advance the ball whenever they tried such plays. On the other hand Mills skirted the ends several times for gains.
