Proctor, Durham boy now staff quartermaster sergeant of the Canadian Guard, in a letter to his father, W. H. Proctor in this city.

"There is no place in the world, says, "where things move so slowly as in England and especially the war of fice. It makes General Carson, who is a self-made, business multi-millionaire of Canada, wild, when he sees things move so slowly. We turn out more work n this office in a day with a force of we officers and four men, than the war office turns out in a day with their hun ired employes.

He says that syndicates and firms in England are willing to take more of the war loan. They have only had one and that was a huge success. He believes another loan of \$2,500,000,000 could be sized in a month's time.
