## NEGRO OUTRAGES 6-YEAR-OLD CHILD **CLUBBING MOTHER**

Arrested, After Wounding Several, and Carried To Jail at Snow Hill

## LATER FRIDAY NIGHT

Little Girl Reported in Terrible Condition; Mother, Mrs. Posseman, Badly But Not Seriously Hurt

(Aperial to the News and Ginerror )

Kinston, April 1 - Will Black, a young negro, scaled his doom Friday after noon when near Snow Hill he commut ted a bestial outrage upon a 6 year old white child, clubbed the little girl's mother to the ground in order to com plete his erings and finally, when brought to hay after a chase through the woods shot J.O. Sugg. a former Green county official, and one other man, name not

The little victim is in a terrible con dition, it is reported. Her mother is braised. Suggs is stated to be badly but not seriously wounded. The white man was slightly injured. Black was wounded in several places His injuries are trifling.

telephone communication with Snow Hill has been possible since Fro day afternoon. The accounts of three responsible Greene county men here tallied in the following details:

Black, who is about sixteen years old encountered little Mattie Tyson, daugh ter of Leon Tyson and wife, and a smaller brother of the girl, playing in a tobacco barn on Tyson's farm some miles from Snow Hill. He seized the girl, the tiny brother running sereaming to his mother. Mrs. Tyson rushed to the scene. Black, angry at the inter ruption, deliberately bent down the woman. Two minutes later he left the prostrute woman and pitiful sletim and ran for the woods.

A posse was soon searching for the negro. Two men ran up with him and discovered that Black was armed with two shot guns and a pistol. They en gaged him in a fight from behind trees. The main bedy of the posse came up and it was then that the two white men and Black were shot. He was taken

and hurried to jail in Snow Hill. Hundreds of men flocked to the little county sent town. They would raze the jail, their leaders declared. Lyuching would have been the least thing possible for the negro they said. Sheriff Williams spirited Black away in an automobile just as they auguard of the mob arrived

Sheriff Edwards at Goldsbore, the recollection of a recent lynching there fresh in his mind, hesitated to admit to day that Black was in jail there. Ficoncerned in some manner with a criminal assault case was carried there from Snow Hill Priday night.

The trouble with the long distance wire from Snow Hill to Kinston was stated to be "natural."

Black's father, who furnished his set arms, was arrested.

### As Heard in Greenville.

Greenville, April 1. Late vesterday about 5 p. m. a young negro named Black committed a criminal assault on a little white girl on the farm of J. Dixon, in Greene county, about four miles from Farmville, this county.

The negro was in Farmvelle at three

o'clock and later left for his home at or near Mr. Dixon's. About five o'clock he met or found the little girl near her home on Mr. Dixon's farm. He attacked her and succeeded in his purpose before her eries attracted her mother. Mrs. Ts. Mrs. Tyson went to the resone o her little daughter and was met by a blow with some weapon from the negro which rendered her unconscious. negro then fled or went home. father. Joe Mack, assisted him in hid ing and gave him a gun to resist arrest the neighbors and soon a number were on the hunt for the negro. The sheriff of Greene and deputies were soon on the The negro was finally located in his hiding place. As the sheriff and posse were closing in on him he opened fire, hitting one of the posse, Mr. Sugg in the legs. He then ran and the posse ood his run, escaping the bullets, when out of another's hands and opened on him. # HARD IT CAPTURE

Four Hundred Under Col. Dodd Push On After Victory of San Geronimo

### PERSHING SPEEDING TO THEIR ASSISTANCE

Commander of Expedition Tos Much Occupied With Task To Take Time To Send Reg ports; Doubt Exists as To Whether Villa Was Party of Bandits Routed Wednesday

By the Associated Press Queretaro, April 1.-Villa has lost a leg, according to a dispatch recelved by the War Department from the municipal president of the town of Temosachic, Chihuahua, who re-ports that Villa was so badly wounded in the surprise attack recently made on the Constitutionalist garrison at Guerrero that amputation of the limb was necessary

Columbus, N. M., April 1 - Roling mercilessly four hundred American troopers under Col George A Bodd are making desperate efforts to capture or wipe out the survivors of Finneisco Villa's largest command, which they defeated at S a decommo ranch several days ago, seconding to meagrs reports from across the border today.
