

RAPID INCREASE IN ROAD FUNDS

GREATEST In 1904 \$80,000,000 Spent For No Simple Test Has Been De-Roads; In 1915 Over \$280,-000,000 Was Spent

(Special Lessed Wire.)
Washington, Oct. 18.—"Rapid in-Before the end of Edison and bridges, growth of building and maintenance activities under State supervision, and a sharp decrease in the proportion of contributions in the form statute labor mark the development of highway work in the United States during the past twelve years," said the Department of Agriculture today.

"The total length of public roads in the United States outside the limits of incorporated towns and cities was about 2,452,000 miles on January 1, 1916. Of this, about 277,000 miles, or 11.3 per cent, were improved with some form of surfacing. The mileage of surfaced roads has been increased at the rate of about 16,000 miles a year, and in 1915 approximately one-half of this increase was made under the supervision of State highway departments. In addition, these departments supervised the main tenance of mearly 52,000 miles of main and trunk-line roads.

"The increase in expenditures for road and bridge work in the United States has been from approximately \$80,000,000 per year in 1904 to about \$282,000,000 in 1915, an increase of more than 250 per cent. The expenditure of than 250 per cent. The expenditure of State funds during this same period in-creased from about \$2,550,000 to more than \$53,000,000. In addition, more than \$27,000,000 of local funds was spent under State supervision in 1915, bringing the total road and bridge expenditures managed by the States to \$80,514,699. This amount is greater than the total expenditures for roads and bridges from all sources in 1904." North Carolina is among the States that have provided a highway depart ment.

The department says: "The growth in importance of the State highway de partments has been rapid. The first of these agencies was created in 1891 in New Jersey, and now some form of highway department exists in every State except Indians, South Carolina, and Texas, Since their inception these departments had expended to January 1, 1916, an aggregate of \$265,350,825 in State funds for road and bridge construction, maintenance, and administra They had constructed over 50, 000 miles of roads in co-operation with the States. More than 40,000 miles of these roads were surfaced.

"The falling off in the value of road work performed by statute and convict was from \$20,000,000 in 1904. when the total road expenditures were \$80,000,000 to about \$15,000,000 in 1915 Mr. W. M. "An increase in the use of better and more expensive types of roads also is shown by the recently compiled statistics. This development has been due, in large part, to the great increase in automobile traffie. It is estimated that there are now approximately two and one-half million automobiles in use on the roads of the country, or one car for every mile of roads. GASOLINE QUALITY HARD TO FIGURE

vised; None Is Likely To Be Found Satisfactory

> News, and Observer Bureau, By H. E. C. BRYANT. (Special Lessed Wire.)

Washington, October 18. The Bureau of Standards of the Department of Commerce announced today that there is no simple test for the quality of gasoline. "In view of the fact that statements have appeared in the press to the effect LOST SUNDAY ON STREETS OF that the Bureau of Standards will for-

mulate a test which may be applied by any purchasers to detect at once an in-ferior product, it becomes necessary to correct any false impression that may have been aroused and to add a brief summary of the situation. In the first place, no such simple test is known in the present state of the science of petroeum technalogy. In the early days of the petroleum industry, when all our gasolines, kerosenes, fuel oils, and lubricating oils were derived from one source, Pennsylvania crude petroleum simple measurement of the specific gravity, or what amounts to the same thing, the Baume number, by means of a hydrometer, served as a fairly reliable indication of the qualities of shese products. Today, however, the specific gravity test is practically less, as a check on the suitability of a gasoline, for example, for a given motor equipment. The reason why this is so is that many new oil fields have been opened up in recent years that yield petroleums of very different physical and chemical properties and new methods of manufacture have been introduced that yield products having very lifferent properties in no way related

othe specific gravities. "The problem is an extremely com plicated one, and presupposes a defini-tion of gasoline. It is highly probable that the specification or definition of standard gusoline and the tests that will be necessary to determine whether the gasoline complies with the specifications will be quite complicated and will require the services of a trained chemist to make them. It seems most probable that the definition of gasoline will have to be based on the percentage that dis tils over between specified temperatures, when the distillation is carried out un der specified conditions. This distillation test, spenking in non-technical is a measure of the freedon

with which the gasoline will vaporize.
"The gasoline must not vaporize to freely for two reasons, one that it would not be safe, and secondly its loss storage, by evaporation would be too great. Hence, the specification may have to contain limitations of the per entage distilling over below a certain emperature, coupled perhaps with a rovision that certain percentages shall listil over below other fixed tempera tures, in order that requisite amount of low boiling constituents shall be present easy starting of an engine Likewise, the specification must contain provision that all must distil over elow a certain maximum temperature in order to exclude from the gasoline the heavier petroleum distillates, such as kerosene."
