SPECTACULAR RISE FURTHER ADVANCES IN COPPER MARKET IN STOCK MARKET

Steel and Other Favorites Make New High Records; Bank Statement Helped

New York, Oct. 28 .- Developments over the

New York, Oct. 23.—Developments over the week-end brought about further appreciable advances in today's active market with new high records for United States Steel and other favorities.

Saturdary's bank statement showing a liberal expansion of local cash holdings and a crresponding contraction of losss, material tennage gains by leading railway systems and unabated demand for products and commodities helped to accelerate today's upward movement. United States Steel passed the preferred for the first time in its history, more than \$30,000 shares of the stock changing hands. Profit-traing caused a moderate setback in industrials toward the close, but this was counter-balanced by greater strength in high grade rails.

Other new maximums included the sugar group, notably Cuban-American at 231 and American Beet at 10215, while Cuba Cane duplicated its best record and American Sugar rose three points to 1205, its highest price of recent years. Central Leather at 93%, American Hide and Leather preferred at 124, and Utah Copper at 10215, all were unprecedented quotations. Bethlehem Steel was unusually active, about 1,800 shares being traded in up to 555, an advance of 35 points. Coppers swelled the huge total, with Republic fron and Steel, Crucible Steel, marines, fertilizers and petroleums and Texas Company gaining more than five points.


