The State Board of Canvassers will, in due course of procedure, issue a certificate of election to Mr. Weaver, which will later be certifled by the Secretary of State and if a subsequent decision of the State Supreme Court should be in Mr. Britt's favor it would of course be valueless to him and the case would have to be contested before Congress.

Judge Adams has asked counsel for Britt to prepare affidavits upon which the petition for an injunction is to be based and will probably consider those affidavits tomorrow. The effect of the injunction, if granted, would be to maintain the present status of the case until the Supreme Court can pass on Judge Adams' decision, made today. Mr. Britt's attorneys also asked for a finding in fact in reference to unmark ballots in certain precincts, but Judge Adams said that it would require an investigation of all these papers. The request was read into the record.

"The United States has now attained position of wealth and of internations financial power which, in the natural course of events, it could not have course of events, it could not have reached for a generation. We must be careful not to impair this position of strength and independence. While it is true that a slowing down in the process of credit extension may mean some curtailment of our abnormally stimulated export trade to certain countries we need not fear that our business will fall off precipitately should we become more conservative in the matter of in vesting in loans, because there are still hundreds of millions of our own and foreign securities held abroad which our investors would be glad to take over, and, moreover, trade can be stimulated in other directions, "In the opinion of the board it is

the duty of our banks to remain liquid in order that they may be able to continue to respond to our home require ments, the nature and scope of which none can forsee and in order that our present economic and financial strength may be maintained when, at the end of the war, we shall wish to do our full share in the work of international reconstruction and develop-ment which will then lie ahead of us and when a clearer understanding of economic conditions as they will then exist, will enable this country more safely and intelligently to do its proper part in the financial rehabilitation of the world."
