the institution, as at present there are no funds available for this purpose. The election of an assistant physician to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. E. M. Gayle was postponed, and the superintendent was instructed to make investigation with a view to getting a first-class trained man in nervous and mental diseases.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: Resolved, that it is the sense of the board that additional employment should be provided for the patients in the way of arts, crafts, manual training, etc. With a view to gathering such information as may be necessary to provide for this work, the superintendent is instructed to make the necessary investigation, and two members of the board are authorized to accompany the superintendent and assist in investigation, in information gathered to be laid before the board for such action as may be deemed best, and the necessary expenses of investigation be borne by the hospital.

A further resolution was unanimously passed: That a dentist be employed for the hospital.

The wards were visited by the directors, and the institution was found to be kept in an up-to-date, first-class order in every respect. The institution in its efficient management and upkeep is ranked as not only one of the best in the South, but in the nation at large.

A Proclamation By The Governor

\$100 REWARD

Whereas, official information has been received at this Department that an unknown party or parties late of the County of Robeson, stands charged with the murder of Neill Shaw, and

Whereas, it appears that the said party or parties have fled the State, or so conceal themselves that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon them; now,

Therefore, I, Locke Craig, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested, do issue this my Proclamation offering a reward of ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS for the apprehension and delivery of the said party or parties to the Sheriff of Robeson County, at the Courthouse in Lumberton, and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal or criminals to justice.

This offer of reward remains in force for two years from this date.

Done at our City of Raleigh, the eighth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, and in the one hundred and forty-first year of our American Independence.

BOARD WESTERN HOSPITAL MEETS

Institution Has Over 1,500 Patients; More Room For Men Is Needed

(Special to The News and Observer.) Morganton, Dec. 8.—The board of directors of the State Hospital, met here Wednesday, consisting of I. I. Davis, chairman; J. P. Sawyer, A. E. Tate, A. A. Shuford, Charles P. Matheson, F. P. Alspaugh, Heriot Clark, L. N. Glenn, and B. R. Clark.

Dr. John McCampbell made an exhaustive and detailed report of the past year's work of the institution. At present there are 1,534 patients in the hospital, an increase over last year of 175. The recovery of patients shows 20 to 100 per cent, for men and 29 to 60 per cent, for women. The general health of the patients has been up to the average, and there has been no serious epidemic.

Two new buildings have been built in the last year: the Receiving Building for women, and the New Colony for men. These two buildings add 160 beds to the capacity of the hospital. There is now being built two large dormitories, with ample space for 100 women. These additions bring the total capacity of the institution up to 1,450 beds. This meets the immediate needs, so far as female patients are concerned.

Room is badly needed for male patients, and an appropriation is to be asked of \$75,000 by the Legislature for the purpose of constructing a reception building for men, and also a dormitory building for the aged and helpless class.

Better fire protection is needed. A new refrigerating plant is badly needed. The annual per capita cost for maintenance has been \$162.25. On account of the high prices of supplies, it is estimated that there should be a per capita allowance of \$181 for the coming year.

The last Legislature appropriated \$60,000 for a new water supply, and this has been provided by installing a gravity line from Clear Creek, nine miles away, and now the institution has an excellent supply of water.

The recommendations made by the superintendent, Dr. John McCampbell, were unanimously endorsed by the board.

The employees petitioned the directors for an increase in wages on account of the high cost of living, and the board expressed the desire to make an increase, but did not feel warranted in doing so until the Legislature makes the appropriation for the support of
