ANNOUNCE NEW ISSUE \$1 AND \$2 GREENBACKS

Treasury To Relieve Unprecedented Demand For Small Paper Money

Washington, Jan. 10.—A new issue of one and two-dollar greenbacks of civil war days, discontinued more than thirty years ago, will be put into circulation, probably about February 1, displacing similar U. S. notes of larger denomination to provide relief from the unprecedented demand for small paper money.

The Treasury Department announced tonight that the issue had been decided on because silver certificates of one and two-dollar denomination, could not be issued under the law in sufficient quantity to meet the demand.

A limit of \$346,681,916 to the amount of outstanding Federal notes was fixed by law in 1878 after the greenback had become an issue in politics and had resulted in the birth of a new national party, backed largely by the farmers of the West and South.

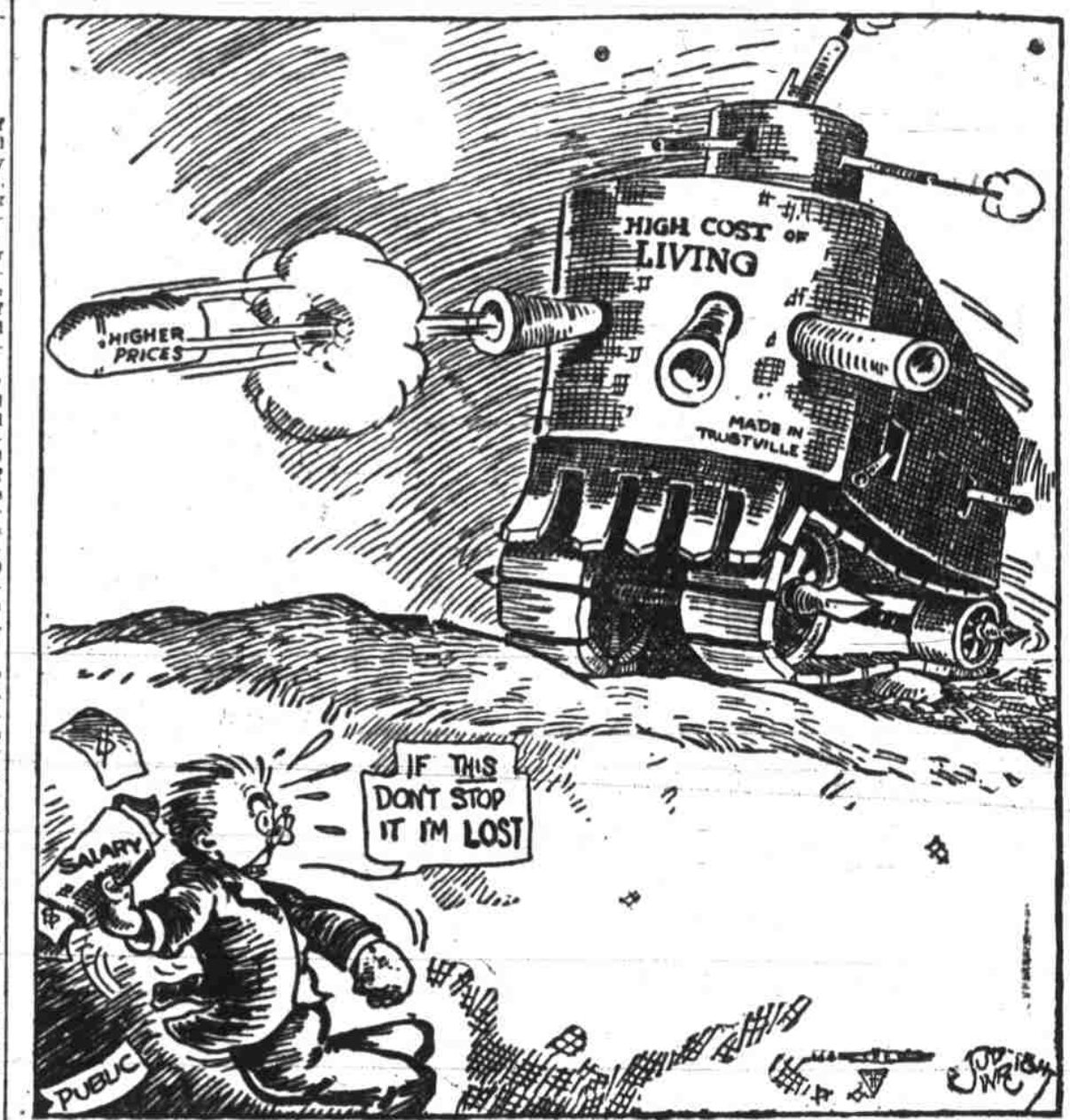

TWO YEAR MILITARY FOR A. & M. COLLEGE

Washington, Jan. 10.—The War Department is putting into operation the national defense act and it affects every section of the country. The following orders, issued some days ago, applies to North Carolina:

CONSTANTINE SOON TO YIELD, IS INDICATION

(By The Associated Press.) New York, Jan. 10.—Failure of King Constantine to accede to the demands of the entente allies has resulted in a virtual blockade of Greek shipping here, it became known tonight. No Greek ships have arrived in this port in several weeks and none has sailed away.

Several Greek ships which put into Bermuda for coal, according to reports here, have been seized by the British. The steamship Themistocles which for three weeks has been anchored off the Statue of Liberty here, has taken on board about 4,000 tons of general cargo. Officials of the line which owns the vessel said they believed the King of Greece soon would comply with the demands of the entente and that the Themistocles could then put to sea.

The officials said the action of the British authorities several days ago in permitting the steamship Patris to proceed from Gibraltar, after having been detained there two months, indicated that an understanding soon would be reached.

RAILROAD EARNINGS BIG; PROFITS SMALL

(By The Associated Press.) Louisville, Ky., Jan. 10.—Although the railroads earned a billion dollars net in 1916—the greatest sum in their history—they made a return of less than six per cent on the railroad property devoted to the use of the public, Frank Trumbull, chairman of the Railway Executive Advisory Committee, told the Louisville Transportation Club tonight.

Mr. Trumbull, who is chairman of the board of directors of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company, appealed to the American public to cooperate in solving the economic problems confronting the railroads.

Federal supervision of railroad securities, Federal incorporation of interstate carriers, Federal regulation of rates, a regional and functional division of the work of the Interstate Commerce Commission, restriction of rate suspensions to not more than 60 days, and giving Interstate Commerce Commission powers to prescribe minimum, as well as maximum, rates, were among the suggestions Mr. Trumbull said would be made to the Interstate Commerce Commission by the railroads. The railroads, he said, wish to be relieved of the inefficient regulation of 48 states and the Federal body, and want this regulation unified under one head with sub-divisions.

HOBSON NOW PROPOSES PROHIBITION FOR WORLD

(By The Associated Press.) Muskogee, Oklahoma, Jan. 10.—An international conference for world-wide prohibition to be held at the same time and place as the peace conference whenever it shall be called for the settlement of the European war, was announced here today by Richmond P. Hobson, National Prohibition Field Worker.

"All the great nations are taking progressive action against liquor and America will take the leadership toward making the whole world dry," he declared.

FIVE FOUND GUILTY OF VIOLATING NEUTRALITY
