Treasury To Relieve Unprecedented Demand For Small Paper Money

Washington, Jan. 10 .-- A new issue of one and two dollar greenbacks of civil war days, discontinued more than thirty years ago, will be put into circulation probably about February 1, displacing similar U. S. notes of larger denomination to provide relief from the un precedented demand for small paper money. The Treasury Department an nounced tonight that the issue had been decided on because silver certificates of one and two-dollar denomination, could be issued under the law in sufficlent quantity to meet the demand. A limit of \$346.681,016 to the amount of outstanding Federal notes was fixed by law in 1878 after the greenback had ecome an issue in politics and had re sulted in the birth of a new nations party, backed largely by the farmers of the West and South. No greenbacks have been issued since 1885, and the amount of outstanding \$1 and \$2 note of that variety now is slightly over \$3. 000,000. There is, however, \$102.445,300 outstanding in U. S. notes of \$10 de nomination and higher and a portion of these will be retired and cancelled dollar for dollar, to meet the new is

sues of small denominations. "The demand for paper currency of the smaller denominations," said the Department's announcement, "has al ways been regarded by the Treasury as an index to business conditions. For many months there has been a con stantly growing demand for one and two-dollar bills, until now it is impossible to meet the country's needs in this respect by means of silver certificates which for more than thirty year have been the only form of paper cur rency issued in one and two dollar de nominations.

"As the supply of silver certificates is fixed by the number of silver dollars coined, such coinage having been dis continued in 1904, it is only possible to increase the number of one and two dollar silver certificates outstanding by cancelling a corresponding number o silver certificates of larger denomina tions.


