



PATRIOTIC ACT OF YOUNG FRENCH GIRL

Who Faced Danger To Carry Important News To American Headquarters

(By The Associated Press.) With the American Army in Lorraine, Sept. 17.—The devotion of a French woman to her country was recorded at one of the American headquarters to which a woman whose name cannot be mentioned had made her way through shell fire and over a region filled with gas and traps to bring to the allies information regarding the Germans.

With her mother and younger brother, the young woman, who is not yet twenty, had lived at Soulevre farm since the day it fell into the hands of the Germans four years ago. Four other brothers are in the French army. The mother and daughter were forced to remain within the German lines and witness the day by day conversion of their property into a German clubhouse. During those four years the two women endeavored to placate rather than to antagonize their captors. From German officers who frequented the farm the young woman learned information which she recognized to be of the utmost importance. When she heard the barrage Thursday morning she determined to run the risk of crossing the nearly three miles separating her home from the allied lines.

Telling her mother and the others that she had work to do in the garden the young woman left the house. She slipped away toward the American lines although every road was swept by allied and German gunfire. After many difficulties and narrow escapes the young woman reached the American lines and told her story.

In return for the information she brought, she asked that every effort be made to rescue her mother and brother. The Germans attempted to maintain their position at Soulevre farm but the Americans overcame them in desperate fighting. The mother and brother were brought to American headquarters today uninjured and there was a joyful reunion.

This would hasten the German official class and the German army, and the war would as a result be continued six months or a year longer than it would otherwise and our boys in France would be kept from returning home that much longer. There is no argument to this, and while I am for the war and for a decisive defeat of autocracy, I also want our boys back home as soon as possible. Hence I shall sustain our commander in chief by voting for a Democrat for Congress this fall—my first vote of the kind.

Revenue Collections. The fifth internal revenue district of North Carolina, with Statesville as headquarters, more than doubled the internal revenue receipts for 1918 compared with the preceding year, according to a statement today by Commissioner of Internal Revenue Daniel C. Roper. The collections for 1917 were \$22,287,186.37, while the receipts for 1918 were \$49,808,840.93. The fourth district, with Raleigh as headquarters, collected \$19,777,494.49 for 1918, compared with a revenue of \$8,610,805.64 in 1917. These figures represent the fiscal year of 1918.

Comparative receipts from income and excess profits tax in North Carolina for the years 1917 and 1918 resulted in the following showing: For 1917, \$1,707,708.64; for 1918, \$30,251,704.10—an increase of \$18,457,905.46. Tobacco taxes, which is shared largely by North Carolina, produced a revenue of \$156,188,859.90, compared with \$102,576,988.14 in 1917.

Soldiers' Insurance. So numerous have been the complaints, the inquiries and letters asking for information concerning war risk policies that Representative Edward W. Pou today sought official information, resulting in the issuance of the following statement from his office: "The relatives of our soldiers and sailors have not received from the government the policies of insurance taken out by the boys in the service. This is a delicate matter and people hesitate to make any inquiry or investigation while they are hoping and praying that their boys will come back unharmed.

"I have looked into this matter and have ascertained from the War Risk Bureau that the possession of an policy or receipt by the relative of the soldier or sailor is not at all necessary if the premiums are being deducted from the salaries of these men. The government keeps a record which of itself is full protection to the man in the service and to the beneficiary under his insurance. "It is said that in course of time policies will be received, but any one can readily understand what an immense task it is to issue policies on the lives of three or four million men. In any event, the government keeps a record and both the man in the service and his beneficiary will be fully protected if the premiums are paid. That is all that is necessary.

"The war risk insurance bureau states that the policies are being mailed out as rapidly as possible."

Army Orders. Second Lieutenant Horace W. Oshes, infantry, is relieved from duty with the United States army training detachment at North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering, West Raleigh, will proceed without delay to Roanoke College, Salem, Va., for duty as commanding officer of the students army training corps unit at that institution. Lieutenant Oshes is appointed acting quartermaster for this unit.

The following named officers of the dental corps are relieved from their present duties and, accompanied by their authorized enlisted dental assistants, will proceed to Charlotte, and report in person to the commanding general, Camp Greene, for duty with base hospital number 122: First Lieutenant Harold S. Condit, First Lieutenant Leander O. Crall.

The appointment of Private Chris C. Hansen, quartermaster corps, U. S. Army, to the present position, with rank from September 11, 1918, is announced. He will proceed without delay to Raleigh, reporting in person to the commanding officer, Camp Raleigh, for duty as an assistant to the camp quartermaster.

Cost of Maintaining Soldier. Under direction of Brigadier General B. E. Wood, acting Quartermaster General of the Army, statistics have been gathered from the clothing, equipment, subsistence conservation, reclamation, and hardware and metals divisions of the Quartermaster Corps to indicate just what it costs a year to maintain a soldier overseas and in the United States. These statistics show that the cost is \$423.47 a year to equip and maintain a soldier overseas and \$327.78 to equip and maintain one in the United States.

The War Department authorizes the following from the office of the Provost Marshal General: "Concerns engaged in the transportation within cities and along the public highways elsewhere of necessary commodities may claim deferred classification for their necessary employees under the provisions of the recent act of Congress referring to persons engaged in industries, occupations or employments, including agriculture, found to be necessary to the maintenance of the military establishment, or the effective operation of the military forces, or the maintenance of national interest during the emergency."

"In such cases, as in all others where claim for deferred classification is made on this ground, evidence must be submitted to the district board to show (1) that the particular concern making the claim is necessary to the maintenance of the military establishment or the effective operation of the military forces, or the maintenance of national interest during the emergency; and (2) that the individual for whom the claim is made is a necessary employee of that concern."
