by the men, however, and they would only go to Obozerskaya. They also stated that general mutiny would soon come if there was not some definite statement forthcoming from Washington with regard to the removal of American troops from Russia at the earliest possible date.

Pending Further Information
The department has called for more information. From the message received today officials were unable to ascertain whether a condition of mutiny had in fact developed in the past ten days. Pending fuller advice, no comment was forthcoming as to the course to be pursued.

Presumably, it was said, Col. Stewart already had been advised directly that it was the purpose of the Supreme War Council, in charge of the policy governing the movement, to withdraw the entire force from northern Russia when the ice blocking the harbors goes out. The British relief expedition, originally scheduled to be 2,400 strong, has sailed, as have the two companies from Scandinavia, and urges the public.

Effect in Signing Peace Treaty.
The weakening of the government's prestige has, according to the reports from Legations in adjacent countries, tended to weaken the official attitude toward the signing of the peace treaty, and President Ebert is reported as having stated in conversation with an intimate that the government would have to sign any peace the allied and associated governments imposed.

high peace and justice throughout the world, express the hope that full restitution will be exacted from the enemy, together with reparation for damage caused to persons and property, and that the full cost of the war will be imposed on those responsible for the greatest crime of history.
"The Senators are resolved to insist that the peace treaty and League of Nations provide legal and territorial guarantees sufficiently strong to prevent future wars and preclude all provocations which might lead to war."

WANT RUSSIAN PREMIERS RETURNED TO RUSSIA

Paris, April 10.—The German armistice commission at Spa, a dispatch from Berlin today says, has addressed a note to the allies urgently requesting the removal to Russia of Russian prisoners of war still in Germany. The German standpoint is that the Russians are increasing the spread of disturbances in Germany.

The note says there is much discontent among the Russian prisoners at their detention while allied prisoners were returned home. The German government, it is added, is apprehensive that the Russians will break from their camps, thus increasing the Bolshevik danger in Germany.

About Evacuation of Odessa.

OFFICIAL VERSION OF MUTINY RUMOR

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of American railway engineers sent at the request of the British authorities to keep open the railroad south of Murmansk.

Announcement of the purpose to withdraw the force was made official to congressional military committees by Secretary Baker February 17, on instructions from President Wilson.

Incident Serious.

The official report makes the incident even more serious than the original account. Intimations that a general feeling of unrest pervaded the entire force have come previously from General Ironside, the British commander in chief.

Both French and British troops have been involved, according to rumor, in similar incidents but American officers on the scene have felt that the morale of the American troops was too high for such an outbreak.

The dispatch today did not show to what extent Bolshevik propagandists could be held responsible for the behavior of the troops, nor has any information reached the department tending to show the extent to which the rebellious attitude may have spread through the whole American contingent.

Drafted Men from Michigan.

The 339th infantry of the 5th division form the bulk of the American contingent in the Archangel region. The unit is almost wholly composed of drafted men from Michigan.

While the action of the company at Archangel undoubtedly is mutinous under any strict interpretation of the military code and would render the men liable to severe discipline under ordinary circumstances, War Department officials did not believe such action would result. It was pointed out that the men apparently obeyed their orders subsequently when the situation had been made clear to them. Only in the event of a refusal which jeopardized the lives of other men, it was thought, would any drastic measures of discipline be invoked. Officers here were frankly doubtful that public sentiment at home would permit any other course and many of them expressed sympathy with the feelings of the men.

Exchange of Prisoners.

Archangel, Wednesday, April 9.—(By the A. P.)—The commission which is to confer with the Bolsheviks regarding the exchange of prisoners will include American British and French officers. The American representative will be Captain Eugene Prince of the military attaché office. The conference is expected to be held tomorrow.

Up to date there are 43 American soldiers listed as missing. No officers are on the list. It is considered that perhaps half the missing men are prisoners. There was artillery activity yesterday on the Deina-Vaga sector but the situation on all the fronts is comparatively quiet.

tions not represented on the council of four.
The publication brought out from the American mission the statement that it was opposed to such a plan.
President Wilson attended the morning and afternoon sessions of the council today. The council had under consideration the remaining details of the Sarre settlement and the Rhine frontier.

There were reports that the Italians were disposed to accept the plan for the Adriatic settlement, which had not previously been satisfactory to them. Should this compromise be effected, it would remove one of the last large obstacles to the consummation of the treaty, though many lesser subjects still remain open.
