### AMERICAN LEGION FAILS TO ATTRACT

#### Only Few Men Respond To Call of Major Mulvey; Meeting Monday Night

Exponents of the American Legion found little encouragement last night at the Chamber of Commerce rooms but those interested will meet again Monday night at 8 o'clock in the interest of the organization. Only a few soldiers were in attendance last night. The lack of attendance created a surprise. There are hundreds of service men in Raleigh who, sooner or later, will perpetuate the memory of their service in the army by joining an organization such as existing now among the Confederate veterans, it was pointed out. Why these returned soldiers are not interested in such an organization now, could not be explained last night.

The American Legion is a proposed organization similar to the different Confederate Veterans branches existing at the present throughout the Southern States. The association to be formed in St. Louis is for all men of the army service—privates and officers. There will be no distinction. Every man will be rated alike.

Whether Lieut. Col. Roosevelt or President Wilson is at the head of the organization carries no significance, it was stated last night. The purpose now is to perfect an organization of American soldiers for years to come.

At the meeting Monday night, it is hoped to have every interested soldier of Raleigh, whether he is an officer or private. There are no bars to recognize and every one will be treated on an equal basis.

The time of the meeting is 8 o'clock. All soldiers and ex-soldiers of Raleigh and Wake county are invited.

### DURHAM WINNER IN DEBATING CONTEST

Goldsboro High School Team Was In Finals at Chapel Hill Event Last Night

Chapel Hill, May 2.—(Special to the News and Observer.)—The final chapter of the seventh annual state wide high school debating contest in which centered concentrated and vitalized interest from 720 debaters representing 190 schools, 75 counties and audiences estimated at 35,000 who have heard the debates throughout the State was written into history here tonight when the Durham high school represented by Miss Auna Holton and Leo Brady won over Miss Bessie Creech and William Hoses of the Goldsboro high school. An audience estimated at 2,000 that filled Memorial hall to its capacity heard the debate.

Resolved, That the government of the United States should adopt a policy of retraining one year of military training of all able-bodied men before they reach the age of 21," was the very discussed. Durham championed the negative side of the question while Goldsboro upheld the affirmative.

**Durham Won Easily.**  
Durham obviously had the decision before the announcement of the judges, Professors H. H. Williams, T. P. McGhee, C. L. Raper, W. S. Bernard and D. D. Carroll, was rendered, although the Goldsboro team put up a spirited fight, and to the Durham school, which was defeated by Pleasant Garden in the 1917 final contest, goes the Aycock memorial cup.

The culmination of tonight's vast speech making program marked another mammoth success for the debating union. The two teams that faced each other were the pick of the 720 youthful debaters who entered the first preliminaries on April 4. They were the winners in the second preliminaries held this morning.

The debaters spoke with most striking composure and in a convincing style. The speeches were fully up to the standard both content and delivery. Dr. H. W. Chase, chairman of the faculty, presided with E. R. Rankin, who has directed the success of the debating as secretary.

**Reception Is Held.**  
Dr. N. W. Walker presented the Aycock memorial cup. The presentation of cups and medals to winners in today's inter-scholastic track meet was made by Dr. A. H. Patterson. Immediately following the debate a reception was held in Bynum gymnasium in honor of the visitors. Dr. Chase pointedly referred to the debates of a means of growing democracy through free and enlightening public discussion. Dr. Walker paid high tribute to high school forces of the State who made the debates a success this year in the face of almost insurmountable difficulties brought about by the war and influenza epidemic.

### ALLIES WILL DIVIDE UP GERMAN VESSELS

Paris, May 2.—It is felt that the final disposition of the enemy ships is purely an inter-allied question and not one for inclusion in the treaty, which provides only for the surrender of the vessels. This action is regarded as indicating that the warships will not be sunk or destroyed.

After the enemy ships are divided among the Allies each power will decide on the disposition of its own quota. The general impression here is that the French and Italians will retain their share and incorporate the vessels in their present fleets, while the British and American tendency inclines to the destruction of their quotas.

### TWO-THIRDS OF MEN HURT, SICK OR KILLED

#### Notable Record of The Rainbow Division Disclosed in Official Report

Washington, May 2.—Only about 25 per cent. of the more than 22,000 men composing the 42nd (Rainbow) division as it returned from France were members of the original division organized at Camp Mills, N. Y., to embark for the front. Practically all of these men, it was learned today, have been wounded or otherwise incapacitated during the months of service. They had been returned from the hospitals and rest camps to the division, and when it received orders for home, a special effort was made by the division staff to get together all the original Rainbow division who had survived the rigors of the campaign.

The intense activity of the division during the fighting is shown by the number of replacement troops which passed through its muster rolls during that period. This number is placed by officers of the division at approximately 67,000 men, against the full war strength of 27,500. Each time it was withdrawn for rest, it was necessary practically to reconstitute the division's personnel because of casualties. Toward the end of the fighting, however, many of the men sent forward in replacement were original members of the Rainbow division who had recovered and returned to duty. This, officers say, accounted for the percentage of its original rolls, which came back with the organization.

### 3,000 MARINE WORKERS STRIKE IN NORFOLK, VA.

Norfolk, Va., May 2.—Following a man: meeting this afternoon of three thousand marine workers who walked out of the plants of the Iron Masters' Association on a strike at 10 o'clock this morning it was announced by strike leaders that the men would remain firm until their federation is recognized by the association. Operators of the plants are just as determined to hold out against any recognition of the federation, claiming that they will deal only with individual crafts.

The strike was very orderly, the men walking out quietly at the hour set. Most of the shops affected were closed during the remainder of the day. Big crowds tonight gathered in the vicinity of the local labor hall, but were orderly and good-tempered. Extra patrolmen on duty as a precautionary measure, found little to do.
