ALLEGED PICKPOCKET IS LOCKED UP WADESBORO

(Special to The News and Observer.) Wadesboro, May 5.—Charged with being a pickpocket, a man giving his name as Blue was held for Superior Court today after a preliminary hearing. He was placed under arrest Saturday and it is alleged that he was operating in the crowd around the army tank that was here. His supposed confederate escaped.

Blue's traveling bag contained a miscellaneous outfit consisting of handkerchiefs of all colors used in all southern railroads, a canvas hat outfit, razors, watch chains, cuff buttons, a muster bag, six eyeglasses, morphine case with pocket syringe, conversion of an English opium ester, a package of green tea, a heavy plain gold ring bearing the inscription "New and F. Nov. 28-1912, 1912." There was also a clipping from a South Carolina paper containing an account of a safe robbery in the Charleston and Western freight office at Spartanburg a few days ago.

Blue came here Saturday morning. He is a small man about 45 years of age and appears to have an injured arm. He claims to live in Columbia, but the authorities there do not know him.

YOUNG CLAN LEADER TO BE ARRAIGNED TODAY

Mountain Boy Who Killed Magistrate Who Had Fined Him \$20

Stanardsville, Va., May 5.—Edgar Morris, mountaineer clan leader, who recently was indicted for the killing in a court room of Magistrate Sullivan, of Stanardsville, and of another mountaineer at a dance, was brought here today from Elkins, W. Va., where he was arrested last Saturday. He was placed in the Stanardsville jail and will probably be given a preliminary hearing tomorrow.

After shooting the magistrate because he had been fined \$20 for disturbing a church service, Morris escaped to the Blue Ridge Mountains and issued a number of threats to "shoot up" the court if he was indicted for murder. His threats resulted in the sending by Governor Westmoreland Davis of a company of troops here to protect the court when the indictments were returned several weeks ago. After the indictments were handed down, a search was begun for the mountaineer, which ended last Saturday in his being found in a rooming house in Elkins, W. Va. BUT FEW ATTEND I.W.W CONVENTION

Chicago City Council "Didn't Wan It" and All, Only 70 Delegates Present

Chicago, Ill., May 5.—The city council indirectly told Mayor Thompson and Chief of Police Garrity by unanimous resolution today that it did not want the I. W. W. national convention, which opened today, to proceed.

While not directing the police specifically to stop the meeting, the resolution read that "it is the sense of the city council of Chicago that no convention or meeting be held in the City of Chicago under the auspices of the Industrial Workers of the World."

The preamble to the resolution cited the fact that most of the delegates to the convention were on the "honor roll" of the organization by reason of prison sentences for disloyalty.

The I. W. W. convention, the first national meeting since 1912, was planned to be the biggest of its kind in the world, but scarcely seventy delegates were present.

The meetings passed without incident, and there was no police interference.

GERMANS WILL GET TREATY TOMORROW

After Sonnino, the leading Italian delegate to the peace conference had left Rome for Paris, and the further news that the Belgian crown council had given its assent to the signing of the peace treaty by the Belgian delegates regardless of the unsatisfactoriness of Belgium of the financial arrangements, have resulted in relieving the embarrassment of the peace conference.

The developments had the effect of producing a call for a plenary session of the conference to be held tomorrow for the purpose of laying the peace treaty before all the participating nations.

The treaty may be presented to the Germans Wednesday or Thursday of this week.

Want No Plebiscite.

Strasbourg, May 5.—(French Wireless Service).—Representatives of the Democratic party of Lower Alsace at a meeting here Sunday adopted a resolution expressing satisfaction on the definite return of Alsace and Lorraine to France. The delegates objected to any idea of a plebiscite in the two provinces, declaring in a resolution that the next elections will manifest clearly the will of the inhabitants of Alsace and Lorraine. Francis Bécourt, president of the regional tribune, presided.

Pendexter Picks Another Plaw.

Washington, May 5.—Action of the peace conference in conferring to Japan territory and rights in the Shantung Peninsula was declared by Senator Pendexter of Washington, Republican, in a statement tonight to be a surrender by League of Nations advocates of their object of guaranteeing territorial integrity and political independence to its members. The Washington asserted that it was "a very illustration of both the futility and hypocrisy of the League of Nations."

PEWS FREE FOR FIRST TIME

Record of Over 200 Years Broken by New York Church. For the first time in the 222 years of its existence all pews were free yesterday at Trinity Church by action of the trustees. Col. William Barclay Parsons, of the 11th Engineers, assisted in collecting the offering.

The Right Rev. Edward Arthur Dunn, Bishop of Panama, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Guatemala and the British and Spanish Honduras, was the speaker. His topic was the work being done there by the church.

He said he is the only Bishop in an area comprising 292,025 square miles, which contain 5,000,000 persons, of whom only 150,000 are churchgoers. He said more clergymen, new houses of worship, schools and many repairs on existing buildings are needed. Because of poor transportation facilities, he said, he wastes six months a year in traveling from place to place in his diocese.

MEMBER OF I. C. C. WILL COME HERE

Federal Body Thinks Freight Rate Matter Important Enough To Send Them

Coming of one of the members of the Interstate Commerce Commission, Commissioner Eastman—to Raleigh on May 22 to take testimony in the freight rates fight now being waged by the Chambers of Commerce of North Carolina and the State Corporation Commission, was announced yesterday by Mr. M. R. Beaman.

Mr. Beaman, as secretary of the Raleigh Chamber of Commerce, has been in Washington, D. C., for the past three weeks, quite a bit of his time being taken up with the freight rate question. He stated yesterday that the fight is being watched closely in traffic circles all over the country.

"The fact that a member of the commission is being sent here is one of the plainest proofs that the commission considers this matter of vital importance. Usually only an examiner is sent to take testimony. It shows that the world outside is watching our fight."

In the meantime, however, the Chambers of Commerce and Corporation Commission are finding the job larger than they had first expected, and quite a bit more expensive. A great many angles not at first contemplated have been opened up and developed. Detailed exhibits of specific rates have been prepared to show the discrimination against North Carolina.

For that reason, Mr. Beaman is trying to get some of the other Chambers of Commerce into the coalition that is making the fight, so as to secure further funds to insure success. Mr. Beaman himself is confident of winning. A Henderson business man wrote the Chamber to the effect that he had saved \$2,250 on one single item, by a reduction as a result of the fight. The cost of the fight to the whole town of Henderson was \$200.
