

WILL DIVIDE TIME BETWEEN 2 TOWNS

Senator Overman Arranges For Celebrations at Statesville and Salisbury

The News and Observer Bureau, 901 District National Bank Bldg. By R. R. WATKINS. (By Special Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., July 2.—Senator Lee S. Overman has succeeded in securing the loan of an airplane from the War Department for Statesville.

The airplane will be used as an additional attraction for the July Fourth celebration at the county seat of Iredell, the occasion being a sort of jubilee in response to the home-coming of the soldiers in Iredell County.

The same airplane that will be used at Salisbury will share a part of the day with Statesville. Hon. Milton A. Barber, rector of the Christ Church of Raleigh, and his son, Milton, were visitors in Washington today. They called to see Secretary Daniels. Milton Barber was on his way to Annapolis, where he will enter the Naval Academy.

Congressmen Go Home. Representative Lee Robinson has left for his home in Wadesboro, where he will spend the congressional recess. Representative E. Y. Webb is at his home in Shelby resting from his labors.

Representative E. W. Fou, John H. Small, Nelson Weaver and Samuel M. Belmont, are the only members of the Tar Heel delegation to remain in Washington for the Fourth of July. The other members are already in the State. Senator Overman left last night for his home in Salisbury.

Secretary of the Navy Daniels and other members of the cabinet will go to New York City Monday to meet President Wilson on his return to America from the peace conference. Vice President Marshall will be among the party, as well as wives of members of the cabinet. Secretary Daniels will go to New York direct from Columbus, Ohio, where he makes a speech on July 5th. Edward E. Britton, secretary to the Secretary of the Navy, will leave Washington tomorrow night for New York, where he will assist in making plans in having the ship, Pennsylvania, ready for members of the cabinet to meet President Wilson when he sails into port.

DR. ANNA HOWARD SHAW PASSES AWAY (Continued from Page One.)

want to live with one of her married sisters in a northern town. After studying at Albion College from 1873 to 1875, she was graduated from the Boston School of Theology in 1878, paying her way through school and college by preaching and lecturing. She suffered extreme poverty during this period, living in an attic in Boston. On account of her sex she was refused ordination by the New England Conference and by the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, but in the same year had the honor of being the first woman ordained by the Methodist Protestant Church. In her struggles to become a minister she fought against ridicule, discussion and lack of the barest necessities.

After seven years service as preacher in a small flock at East Dennis, Mass., Dr. Shaw resigned from the pulpit to take up the fight for temperance, for suffrage and for social justice. Her association through her preaching, with such prominent women as Mary A. Livermore and Julia Howe, enlarged her view of life and aroused enthusiasm for the cause of suffrage and liberty.

Chosen as Suffrage Worker. Dr. Shaw first became a lecturer for

the Massachusetts Women's Suffrage Association, and from 1886 to 1892 was national superintendent of franchise. On the resignation of Dr. Shaw's most intimate friend, Miss Susan B. Anthony in 1900, the presidency of the National Women's Suffrage Association rested between Dr. Shaw and Mrs. Carrie B. Chapman, whom Miss Anthony finally chose as the more experienced, while Dr. Shaw was made vice-president-at-large. However, in 1904 Mrs. Chapman was compelled to resign on account of ill-health, and Dr. Shaw succeeded her as president of the national association from 1904 to 1915.

Her administration was marked with by unprecedented progress. The number of suffrage workers increased from 17,000 to 20,000; one campaign in ten years was replaced by ten in one year; the expenditures of the association increased from \$15,000 to \$50,000 annually; the number of states with full suffrage grew from four to twelve while the whole suffrage movement changed from an academic study to a vital political force arousing the attention of the entire nation.

The year 1912 was the banner year for Dr. Shaw and the cause, when Arizona, Kansas and Oregon received full suffrage. During this year Dr. Shaw spoke in the principal cities in each of these states making four or five speeches a day and traveling in any sort of conveyance from freight cars to automobiles.

Courageous and Determined. Many times during her earlier career, Dr. Shaw gave proof of her courageous and determined nature. On one occasion the free religious group of which she was pastor, wished to give a dance on the night of the annual church fair, and the intrepid little preacher was obliged to threaten the whole congregation with arrest to maintain her authority. As a country school teacher, she preached her first sermon at the suggestion of a friend requesting it to the town and staves in advance.

While in Boston Dr. Shaw reached the point where she had not a cent of money nor the prospect of earning any. Unexpectedly she was asked to do a week's revival work and decided that if this brought her enough money for a cheap pair of shoes and a few days food, she would continue her course in theology. A shiftless woodsman was once conducting her through a northern forest to a town where she was to preach and refused to drive further, whereon the girl pulled out a small revolver and held it at his back until she reached her destination.

Dr. Shaw was born at Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, February 14, 1847. She was never married.

Richmond, Va., July 2.—Three express cars on the Seaboard Air Line train No. 68 bound from Richmond, north, left the rails at Millford, 35 miles from here, at 8:25 tonight. E. D. Laffler, express messenger, was badly injured and brought to a hospital here. In leaving the rails the telegraph wires were torn down, the railway officials unable to get details, ordered a crew of doctors both from Richmond and Fredericksburg. Their services were not required.

No cause was given for the wreck by officials here. It was reported that the express cars turned completely over and rolled down an embankment.

RITCHIE HAS TALK WITH GOVERNOR

Neither Making Statements After Conference But Ritchie Goes On With Work

PLANNING ORGANIZATION OF KLANSMEN IN RALEIGH

Will Give Demonstration Friday Night in City Auditorium and Will Also Lecture On Patriotic Subjects, Including Labor Situation and Woman Suffrage

Texas Ritchie, organizer of the Legal Order of Klansmen, yesterday afternoon flung his hat on the floor of the governor's private office and had a heart to heart talk to Governor Bickett who Monday attacked his order as a gold brick scheme and a wicked appeal to race prejudice. But neither the governor nor Ritchie were talking much after the conference.

It is safe to say, however, that Governor Bickett was much pleased with the big frank Texas, and that he sought to impress upon him his own opinion of the Legal Order of Klansmen. But Ritchie wasn't to be impressed. The conference closed with both the governor and Ritchie in the same relative position.

Governor Bickett did say, however, that he had not heard anything from Ritchie which changed his original attitude, and the fact that Ritchie had made personally a fine impression did not remove the danger of the organization. He stated that the entire matter had been turned over to the Attorney General, intimating that there would be other conferences between Ritchie and that official.

Says He is Friend of Labor.

In the meanwhile, Ritchie has turned from the allegation of race prejudice in his order to meet another source of opposition in the quarter of organized labor. He had said before, he said, that he was being attacked in this direction and made haste to declare emphatically that he is a friend of the working man, has been a working man himself and is holder of a Union card as a diver.

With all this, he is going ahead with plans for the organization in Raleigh. Friday night at 8 o'clock he will stage a demonstration in the city auditorium where he will also lecture on popular subjects including woman suffrage.

"I'm going to show why we don't want woman suffrage in the South," he said, "and why a southern gentleman can protect his family and his home without the ballot."

Ritchie himself, is a strong opponent of suffrage, and maintains that he is going to live in North Carolina and keep his family here until North Carolina allows its women to vote. Then he is going to move away.

Friday Night Event.

The demonstration Friday night will be the strong man stunt, an act which he claims has brought him from \$500 to \$1,000 a week in the past, but which he is giving up to promote the Legal Order of Klansmen. It will be free and Ritchie is inviting the men of Raleigh to come, bring their wives, children and friends.

His lecture, he says, in addition to the suffrage feature, will deal with the record of the army and navy, especially the North Carolina troops; the labor situation and the progress of the State. Incidentally, he expects to present the claims of his order and to prove that it is not a "blue sky" scheme.

U. S. EMPLOYMENT SERVICE REOPENS

Dr. George J. Ramsey Instructed To Resume Work After 24 Hours Cessation

The United States Employment Service has been ordered to resume in North Carolina, according to announcement of Dr. George J. Ramsey, State director, yesterday, although Dr. Ramsey doesn't know under what arrangement and to what extent the new activities of the organization will be continued.

The order to resume came to Dr. Ramsey within twenty-four hours after the receipt of an order to discontinue all work and close up the offices on account of failure of Congress to provide an adequate appropriation. There is a reduced appropriation to the amount of \$400,000, it appears, and Dr. Ramsey believes that this will be used to tide over the organization until such time as Congress makes adequate provision for the work.

But for a certainty, Dr. Ramsey knows nothing about the future of his office. He himself has already resigned to take up other work, and the North Carolina end of the employment service will very likely be handled by another.

July requirements of the railroads, approximately \$95,000,000 were met from cash on hand and no checks were issued against the appropriation made by Congress which is not yet available as the signed bill has not reached this country. Mr. Hines made this statement in answer to published reports that checks dated July 1 had been sent out with the provision that they should not be used unless the railroad bill became law by that date.

"The railroad administration," Mr. Hines said, "has never in the past given, and will not in the future give, available in banks to pay them when presented."
