the investment of accumulated funds, the annual/ "fleecings" are mounting into the billions.

In North Carolina the adminstration of the "Blue Sky" law through the State Insurance Commissioner is being pushed with valuable Federal co-operation and special effort is being made to check the efforts of these swindlers

to get hold of Liberty Bonds they find in the hands of good patriotic citizens every Sunday at 3:00 p. m., in the city who listen to their proposals to take them over in connection with schemes that will ultimately fleece the investors and cost them the securities they hold.
