

DURHAM WEDDING OF MUCH INTEREST

Lieut.-Col. Sidney C. Chambers and Miss Lucy Ball Wright Married

Durham, July 12.—Lieut. Col. Sidney C. Chambers, late of the American Expeditionary Forces in France, has won a victory in an engagement of Peace as less renowned than those in the late world war. A beautiful church wedding was solemnized this morning at 10 o'clock, in Trinity Methodist church, when he and Miss Lucy Ball Wright, daughter of Mrs. Thomas D. Wright, of this city were married. The large chancel of the church was a beautiful grove of pedestals, high and low, which supported vases and wicker baskets of lovely flowers, with potted plants and palms artistically arranged to give a most charming effect.

The marriage was beautiful in its simplicity. The ushers were Sam Sparger, Richard Wright, James Patterson, Ernest Seeman and J. Ed. Pogram, who, after seating a comfortably filled auditorium, with a large gathering of the friends of the couple, to the strains of the wedding march, played on the organ by Miss Alice Handy, proceeded down the aisle, and formed on either side of the altar improvised at the center of the chancel rail. The attendants were Miss Nannie Bel Wright, and Miss Cora Wright, sisters of the bride; and Dr. C. Woodard and James Patterson. Mrs. S. B. Pierce, sister of the bride, was dame of honor and came in with the bride, who was met near the chancel by the groom and his best man, Judge R. H. Sykes. The marriage ceremony was performed by Rev. C. J. Harrell, pastor of Trinity Church, in an impressive and beautiful manner, the ring service being used.

The bride an attractive and popular young woman was attired in a most becoming going-away costume. They immediately motored to Raleigh, where they took a train for northern cities to spend the first days of their honeymoon. A large gathering saw them start on their journey, with ringing good wishes and bon voyage on the sea of matrimony.

Increase in Durham's Wealth.
Register of Deeds, M. G. Markham, has just finished tabulating the work of the tax listers and assessors, and there is shown a material increase in the city and county taxable property. The total increase shown amounts to \$1,454,512 not including the public service concerns. The valuation this year is \$25,982,418 as against \$24,527,906 last year. The wealthiest portion of the property lies in the city and township of Durham. The other townships of the county line up as follows with increases, which do not show the total valuations: Mangum, \$82,053; Carr, \$38,971; Patterson, \$38,430; Lebanon, \$32,842; Cedar Fork, \$18,977; Oak Grove, \$14,663.

OPTOMETRISTS TO MEET THIS WEEK IN TWIN CITY

Annual Convention Will Be Featured By Several Instructive Lectures

Winston-Salem, July 12.—The twelfth annual meeting of the North Carolina State Optometric Society will be in session here Wednesday and Thursday of next week. The visitors will be welcomed by Dr. Howard Rothaler, president of Salem College, and the response will be made by Dr. A. G. Spingler, of Raleigh. Dr. R. C. Augustine, president of the national society, will also speak on this occasion and is on the program for several subsequent addresses.

A. P. Staley, of High Point, is president, and H. M. Van Sless, of Gastonia, is first vice-president; John D. Perry, of Winston-Salem, is secretary and treasurer.

Dr. W. P. Hedrick, of Raleigh, is on the program for an address and W. G. Frazier, of Durham, will deliver the eulogy to deceased members. The convention will close Thursday night with a banquet.

Following the convention the State Board of Examiners will hold an examination for candidates for license to practice optometry. This board is composed of A. G. Spingler, president; J. W. Taylor, secretary; F. C. Roberts, A. P. Staley and Fred N. Day.

TO INVESTIGATE ALLEGED CRUELTY TO U. S. SOLDIERS.

Washington, July 12.—Investigation of charges of cruelty to American soldiers arrested in France and placed in prisons in and near Paris, will be conducted next week by a sub-committee of the special House committee investigating War Department expenditures. Accusations made in the House today by Representative Dallinger, Republican, of Massachusetts, will be inquired into first.

Mr. Dallinger declared he "had become convinced there was truth in the reports of cruelty."

TRADE COMMISSION TO AID STATE IN RUNNING SWINDLERS TO COVER

The Federal Trade Commission at the national Capitol has joined hands with the State Authorities, especially the state officials having the enforcement of the "Blue Sky" laws in hand, in a determined effort to weed out the swindlers who are constantly fleeing the inexperienced investor. In ordinary times the harvest of these swindlers runs into the millions and now under the increased wage and greater profit making that has greatly quickened the spirit of speculation in connection with the investment of accumulated funds, the annual "fleeings" are mounting into the billions.

In North Carolina the administration of the "Blue Sky" law through the State Insurance Commissioner is being pushed with valuable Federal co-operation and special effort is being made to check the efforts of these swindlers to get hold of Liberty Bonds they find in the hands of good patriotic citizens who listen to their proposals to take them over in connection with schemes that will ultimately fleece the investors and cost them the securities they hold. It is urged that any one knowing of questionable or fraudulent promotion or of soliciting of questionable schemes of any sort shall report them to James B. Young, insurance commissioner, Raleigh, N. C., and there will be put forth the combined effort of the State and Federal authorities to run down the swindlers and save the people of the State from their questionable and fraudulent schemes.
