

Chapel Hill, July 13.-The University Summer School will take an active part in Orange County's welcome to its re-turned heroes Wednesday, July 16. The train from here will carry special coaches and other facilities will be procoaches and other facilities will be pro-vided for students who wish to go to Hillsboro for the day. In the after-moon the Summer School will present a play, "Eather Wake," in the open for the benefit of the soldiers' and their guests. A special stage has been con-structed in Cameron Park, and Pro-fessor A. Vermont has been busy for some time training a cast for the pro-duction. Burning Vessel Sighted. Mobile, Ala., July 13.—Captain Ahmen, of the United States Shipping Board steamer, Eastern Sun, reported today having sighted a burning vessel in longitude 24 degrees, 15 minutes north, latitude 82 degrees, 20 minutes west, on July 8. The name of the vessel, as well as the fate of the crew aboard is a mystery. The Eastern Sun was bound from New York to Mobile. Captain Ahmen said that while his

stcamer was about 20 miles south, southwest of Rebecca Shoals Light in the Guif of Mexico, he sighted the burning vessel about 12 miles distant from the Eastern Sun, he said, when he changed his course and headed for the distressed vessel.

At 12:45 a. m., July 9, the Eastern Sun approached within 300 yards of the burning vessel, sounded the whistle of the ship to attract any possible survivors and later made a careful scapeh of the waters in the vicinity of the vessel. No survivors were found, neither was the identity of the vessel discovered.


