

PARALYZED FROM ELECTRIC SHOCK

Goldboro Man Seriously Injured; Senator Reed Agrees To Speak Next Thursday

Goldboro, N. C., July 18.—After 2,300 volts of electricity had passed through his body, C. B. Austin, a young white man employed on the construction force of the Carolina Power and Light Company, of this city, was dragged from the top of one of the company's poles here yesterday in an unconscious condition. Young Austin received the "shock" while adjusting some wires. He was rushed to a local hospital where an examination of his injuries was made after which, it was learned that he is paralyzed in his left side.

Hon. W. S. O'B. Robinson, of the local bar, received a telegram today from Senator Reed, of Missouri, in which the latter stated that he would be pleased to accept an invitation extended to him by Goldboro citizens to deliver an address in this city next Thursday on the League of Nations. The hour for the speaking has not yet been decided upon, but will probably be at 11 o'clock in the morning, according to the opinion of Judge Robinson, and in the courthouse.

Owing to the inclement weather the Farmers' barbecue scheduled to be given today, has been indefinitely postponed, according to an announcement made this morning.

City Manager Dr. I. M. Cashell announced this morning that Goldboro citizens were paying little heed to the recent warning regarding dogs at large on the streets in violation of the city ordinance. Beginning next Monday Manager Cashell says dogs will be caught wherever possible and impounded, and, in addition, the owners will be prosecuted. A large cage is now being erected to place the dogs in, and the police have been instructed to enforce the law.

Recently Mayor E. H. Bain, of this city, was officially cited for bravery in action on September 29, 1918. Yesterday notice was received here of a further and much greater official honor bestowed upon Captain Bain for his courageous service while in France. It has been officially announced through Washington that General Pershing has awarded Captain Bain the Distinguished Service Cross for "extraordinary heroism" in action at Busigny, France, on October 9, 1918. This is the first honor of its kind to be conferred upon a Goldboro soldier. However, two such decorations have been awarded to soldiers in this county.

The county commissioners have granted permission to the War Camp Community Service to use the brick building formerly used as the register of deeds' office. Once or twice a week will be given over to community singing to which everybody will be invited. Lanes in there will be athletic and dramatic entertainments. For the benefit of Goldboro mothers who wish to go shopping the War Camp Community Service has employed an experienced colored nurse whose duty it will be to take care of their babies. The nurse will be located at the public comfort room.

Rev. C. M. Thomas, of Wilmington, Del., opened a revival meeting tonight at Belfast, near Goldboro, and has with him as co-workers, Revs. Bartlett, of Wilmington, and Taylor from Eng-

land, the latter being an excellent musician. The Wayne County North Carolina State College Alumni Association has been affected in this city. Burton White, alumni secretary of the State College, was present and assisted in the organization. R. E. Stevens, of Goldboro, was elected president; Jasper E. Pippin, of Fremont, first vice-president; H. C. McPhail, of Mount Olive, second vice-president, and A. K. Robertson, of Goldboro, secretary and treasurer. Friends in Goldboro and throughout the State will be pleased to learn that Mr. J. B. Thompson, one of Wayne county's most highly esteemed farmers, is now considered safely round the crisis of his recent operation at a local hospital.
