Goldsboro, N. C., July 18.—After 2, 360 votes of electricity had passed through his body, C. B. Austin, a young white man employed on the construction force of the Carolina Power and Light Company, of this city, was dragged from the top of one of the company's poles here yesterday in an unconscious condition. Young Austin received the "shock" while adjusting some wires. He was rushed to a local hospital where in examination of his injuries was made after which, it was learned that he is paralyzed in his left side.




