

### EPIDEMIC IS FOUND NEAR PILOT MILLS

#### 25 Cases of Whooping Cough Give Health Men Chance To Try Vaccine

Discovery of an epidemic of whooping cough at Pilot Mills, in the northern part of the city, has been made by Dr. George S. Bote of the city-county health board.

There are 25 cases in the vicinity there. As a direct outcome of the epidemic, Dr. Bote is trying out his whooping cough vaccine. It has been given to all who are sick, and is being administered at the offices in the Court House to all who apply during the afternoons.

The health board is emphasizing the need for vaccination, especially as regards typhoid. There are no cases of typhoid in the city now, and have been only 15 this year, against a total of 78 last year. "But," remarks Dr. Bote, "the worst month—August—is yet to come."

If you were to offer a man insurance on his house without premium for two years, says the doctor, he would accept at once. And yet the people are not responding to this free vaccine as they should. "It is insurance for at least two years, without premium," he said. The county board offers vaccine for typhoid, small pox, diphtheria, and whooping cough. A small charge is made for the diphtheria vaccine, to cover the cost of the package. The others are free.

### NASH COUNTY VETERAN DIES IN RALEIGH

#### Mr. Perry Van Renfrow Passes Away at Home of His Daughter, Mrs. Chas. G. Donk

Mr. Perry Van Renfrow, native North Carolinian and Civil War veteran, died yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the home of Mrs. Charles G. Donk, after a lingering illness lasting over several months. He was 78 years old.

The deceased was a native of Nash county, and was the first citizen to locate in what is now Spring Hope. During the war he served with Company I, 50th North Carolina Regiment. He was also an active member of the Episcopal church.

Mr. Renfrow is survived by six children: B. F. Renfrow, of Raleigh; A. H. Renfrow, of St. Louis, Missouri; S. S. Renfrow, of Parsons, Kansas; L. E. Renfrow, of Norfolk, Virginia; Mrs. Charles G. Donk and Miss Pansy Renfrow, of Raleigh.

### MOBILE SCHOOLS ARE WELL ATTENDED NOW

#### Much Interest Manifested According To Reports To Secretary Johnson

Reports received at the office of State Secretary Walter N. Johnson of the Baptist Board of Missions, indicate a most refreshing interest manifested in the several score of mobile schools that are in progress this week in all sections of the State.

Telegrams and letters tell of the opening of the schools with good attendance and keen determination. This is the second year that the Baptist denomination has conducted, through the Board of Missions, these mobile schools and this work has already shown its even greater importance because of the fact that the Baptist seventy-five million campaign is being launched. This campaign proposes that the Baptists of the South shall increase their offerings to missionary and benevolent objects to a minimum of \$15,000,000 a year for the next five years. This amount is over and above the local church expenses. The campaign will include thorough training and an canvass of every member of every Baptist church in the South.

North Carolina has as its goal six millions or \$1,200,000 a year for the next five years.
